## ENGLAND TO FIGHT GERMANY

LONDON, Aug. 5.—When Great Britain declared war on Germany at 7 o'clock last night, every first-class power in Europe, with the exception of Italy and Spain, who will defend their neutrality with arms, if necessary, was in a state of war with some other nation.

With Serbia and Montenegro shoulder to shoulder with the triple entente, the lineup today in the world war is Russia, France, England, Montenegro and Serbia, against Germany and Austro-Hungary.

They Will Resist  
Belgium and Holland will resist the invasion of German arms in their territories.

Without waiting for the time limit given Germany to reply to England's demands regarding the observation of the neutrality of Belgium to expire, the British foreign office last night issued the following declaration of war:

"Owing to the summary rejection by the German government of the request made by his Britannic majesty's government that the neutrality of Belgium should be respected, his majesty's ambassador at Berlin has received his passports, and his majesty's government has declared to the German government that a state of war exists between Great Britain and Germany from 11 o'clock p. m., Aug. 4." In Berlin, Sir William Edward Goschen, British ambassador, called at the German foreign office, formally announced the English declaration of war, and demanded his passports.

The German reply was the issuance of the passports and the summary rejection of demands that neutrality in Belgium be respected.

War Popular in England  
The war move is a popular one in England.

Newspapers opposed to the Asquith administration have rallied to its support.

Last night thousands of people, fired with patriotism, sang before Buckingham palace until the king and queen, the Prince of Wales and Princess Mary appeared on the balcony and waved their handkerchiefs.

Delayed at N. Y.  
NEW YORK, Aug. 5.—Thousands of reservists are flocking to New York and are delayed in obtaining transportation abroad. Immigrant homes are caring for hundreds without funds. As their number increases the problem grows more serious. Federal immigration officials and state and city charity officers held a meeting today to discuss relief.

Sink War Craft  
LONDON, Aug. 5.—A German torpedo boat has been dynamited and sunk in the Baltic, two miles off Godesburg, according to a Copenhagen dispatch received here today. Thirty of the crew drowned.

Porte to Fight  
NEW YORK, Aug. 5.—Lieut. J. Cyril Porte, Royal Navy, who was to have attempted to fly the Atlantic in a hydro-aeroplane next month, sailed on the Lusitania to fight for England in the European war.

Bottle Up Fleet  
CONSTANTINOPLE, Aug. 5.—The Porte announced today that the Bosphorus was closed to war vessels. The Russian Black sea fleet, therefore, is bottled up.

Hold 57 as Spies  
PARIS, Aug. 5.—Germans special permission will be arrested as spies henceforth, it was announced today. Forty-six men and 11 women were already held.

Shoot Aviator  
BRUSSELS, Aug. 5.—Belgian sharpshooters shot a German aviator literally to pieces over Liege today. His body fell within the Belgian lines. Other German aviators were thereupon withdrawn.

## SEATTLE FOLK AMONG AMERICANS STRANDED IN EUROPE

Somewhere over in war-stricken Europe are a lot of well-known Seattle people, marooned, thousands of miles from home, with prospects of leaving the country just as bad as they can be.

An indication of the experiences Americans are having comes in a dispatch today from Paris, in which it is stated that the government is seizing Americans' automobiles.

Mrs. Potter Palmer's was seized yesterday. The car of Judge E. H. Gary, of the United States Steel corporation, may go next.

As many as can are leaving France, following up on a promise that the mere assertion that they are Americans will pass them.

Two thousand homesick Americans met in one of the big ballrooms of Paris yesterday and discussed ways and means of getting home.

Paris is facing hunger. The banks are withholding money. Americans are panic stricken. All day yesterday they besieged the American embassy, and were given certificates of American nationality by Henry W. Diederich, the American consul general at Paris.

Several American women may respond to an invitation by the wife of American Ambassador Herrick, Mrs. George Carroll and Mrs. H. H. Harjes to stay and aid in forming an American hospital in Paris.

That Americans are willing to come home in anything that floats, is apparent from the news that 200 of them are sailing from Bristol, Eng., on the steamer Montagu, a fruit carrying craft.

A spirit of comradeship and mutual helpfulness is manifesting itself in London. The inability of hundreds of American millionaires to get enough money for passage, yesterday moved those with ready cash to share it with their companions.

Herbert C. Hoover, Californian, advanced \$25 and up to more than 300

Americans, and will continue the good work until his currency is exhausted.
