Need Thousands of Women to Nurse Millions in Great War

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 7.—The International Relief Board of the American Red Cross society, has sent out word that it will receive and forward contributions for the relief of the European Red Cross in its work on the field of battle.

Activities are at present going forward in every part of the world with a view of raising money and recruiting the necessary forces.

Every Red Cross chapter in the United States has been notified.

Angels of Mercy Ready

Not only are the Gods of War arming to slaughter and kill—but the Angels of Mercy are gathering to gather their battalions to administer to the sick and wounded when the smoke of conflict has blown away and the moans of the dying supplant the roar of cannon and the rattle of musketry!

If 20,000,000 soldiers engage in battle, it is conservatively estimated that 3,000,000 will be wounded if the war lasts over a period of years. To adequately care for 3,000,000 wounded men, many of whom are laid up for long periods, 5,000 to 7,000 nurses will be required, not counting the surgeons and helpers. These women will come from all parts of the world—they will range in age from 18 to 60.
