CROWNPRINCE LEADING ARMY BEFORE LIEGE

BRUSSELS, Aug. 7.—The crown prince of Germany is in his glory. The longings of his young life are knowing their fulfillment. At last he is having a taste of real warfare. The crown prince is a warlike sort. Ever since he learned to talk he has worried the royal household with his yearnings to lead an army into battle. And now that he is really into it, he is proving himself as fierce in action as he was in talk. In the Belgian fight he has distinguished his generals and has placed himself at the head of the army. What the crown prince says goes. He is here, there, everywhere—where the bullets are flying thickest, and whether the military leaders like his assumption of authority or not they have no choice but to follow his leads.

ENGLAND PREPARES FOR LONG CAMPAIGN

LONDON, Aug. 7.—Great Britain is preparing for a long and hard war. Lord Kitchener, new minister of war, has issued a call for an immediate enlistment of 100,000 additional men. The war budget of \$500,000,000 and the call for 500,000 men have been approved. New men are required to enlist for three years or as long as the war lasts. Enlistment age is between 19 and 35. The naval call provides for 87,000 additional officers and men.

G. T. P. VESSELS ARE TIED UP IN SEATTLE

The European war has caused officials of the Grand Trunk Pacific Steamship Co. to tie up in Seattle the two liners, Prince George and Prince Rupert. The vessels will be held here until sailing conditions on the high seas become less a menace to property.

Shrieks for Bread Coming Soon From People of Europe

WASHINGTON, Aug. 7.—Europe faces a more terrible thing than even a great general war—a far more ghastly thing than torn bodies on a score of battlefields. That thing is—**FAMINE!** History has never known such a conflict as the European war, so history can throw little light on the effect a bitter and protracted fight will have upon the food supply of the world.

THE SIEGE OF PARIS IN THE FRANCO-PRUSSIAN CONFLICT, WHEN THOUSANDS DIED OF STARVATION, WOULD BE INFINITESIMAL IN COMPARISON. Famine trends close upon the heels of war in Europe because Europe, with its vast population and its comparatively small area, is pressed even in times of peace to supply its millions with food enough to sustain them.

It is commonly known that the British Isles could subsist without importations only 21 days; that is, if Great Britain were called upon to feed the people of England, Scotland, Wales and Ireland without outside assistance, its supply of food would be exhausted within three weeks.

Conditions in continental Europe, particularly in small, insular states, are worse. Without importations and without food from their own fields, the approach of famine would be a matter of only a few days. The alarm of the European gov-

Kaiser Inspires People

LONDON, Aug. 7.—A dispatch from Berlin gives the text of a statement issued to the German army and navy by the Kaiser, evidently with a view to inspiring the warriors in the face of reported defeats of the German army. "After 43 years of peace I call upon all Germans capable of bearing arms. We have to defend our most sacred possessions in fatherland and home against the reckless assaults of enemies on all sides of us. That means hard fighting. I am confident that the ancient warlike spirit still lives in the German people—that powerful, warlike spirit which attacks the enemy wherever it finds him, regardless of cost, and which in the past has been the dread and terror of our enemies. I have confidence in you, German soldiers—in each and all of you. An ardent, indomitable will for victory is living in each and all of you. I know, if needed, each and all of you would die like heroes. Remember our great and glorious past and that you are Germans. God bless you." (Signed) "WILLIAM."

Poor Belgium! Again a Battlefield

Belgium, from its early Roman history, was often a pawn in the game of nations, only winning its independence in 1830. Rome held it as a province. The Franks ruled it for a few centuries. It was part of Spain during the last days of that empire's grandeur. It passed on to France, Austria and Holland. It followed the fortunes of Napoleon, and the great battle of Waterloo was fought on its soil. The French revolution gave the inspiration for the final revolt for independence from Holland, to whose rule it was given after Napoleon's downfall. Belgians have had little reverence for kings. Even in the middle ages it led in commerce and arts. Antwerp, Brussels and Ghent early furnished an inspiration for independence and industry. Its vast system of co-operative stores, owned by workers, and the system of proportional representation of government reflect the demand of its people to be allowed to work out their own destinies, instead of furnishing a battleground for neighboring monarchs.

Two Great Battles Raging

LONDON, Aug. 7.—The eyes of the world today are directed to two great battles now in progress in the general European war, one between the fleets of Great Britain and Germany in the North sea, and the other the land struggle between the German and Belgian forces before Liege. Repulsed with terrific losses, estimated at between 10,000 and 20,000, the German army today renewed its attack on the Belgian forces before Liege. Thousands of Germans were blown up yesterday in an effort to cross mined ground. Two outer forts were captured by the Germans after an appalling loss, and a detachment of Uhlans gained entrance to the city and were about to capture the high officers when they were surprised and slaughtered.

Austria to Watch Russia

VIENNA, Aug. 7.—The Austrian war office here assured the German government today that Austria-Hungary was prepared to protect the Russian frontier, leaving Germany free to concentrate its energies against France and Belgium. The Russian forces are mobilizing slowly. German border patrols have made frequent raids into Russia, burning villages, destroying railroads and cutting wires, but there have been no general engagements. A Russian cavalry division which had ventured into Germany was repulsed Thursday.

British Warship Blown Up

LONDON, Aug. 7.—It is admitted by the admiralty that the British cruiser Amphion has been sunk by a mine in the North sea. The Amphion, a war vessel of 3,440 tons, was with the British torpedo boat Lancer when the latter sunk the German mine layer Koelnig Lulse in the North sea. Before the Lulse was sent to the bottom it evidently had done some mine planting, however, and presumably it was one of these mines which the Amphion struck. Of the cruiser's crew 131 were drowned and 135 saved.

London Banks Reopen

LONDON, Aug. 7.—The banks here reopened today, after a five days' suspension. There was a great run, but there was a decided rush for withdrawals, not the result of panic, but due to the fact that funds, after being so long tied up, were urgently needed. Very little gold, to which the British public is accustomed, was paid out, however, its place being taken by the new notes representing the English equivalent of about \$7.20. Great Britain's smallest notes hitherto have been for approximately \$24. In response to the war office's appeal for volunteers, recruits are already enlisting in large numbers. The call was for 100,000 men, though War Minister Lord Kitchener was authorized to bring the number up to 500,000. It is believed it will yet be necessary to ask the full quota.
