Wilson, Haggard With Sorrow, at Desk Again Today

WASHINGTON, Aug. 7.—President Woodrow Wilson and his three daughters woke to a cheerless day this morning burdened with the sorrow which came with the death of the president's wife at 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon. She succumbed to Bright's disease.

The national capital is in mourning. Everywhere about the city are touching tributes of sympathy for the bereaved first family of the land and marks of respect and devotion to the memory of the lovable woman who was the mistress of the White House until death took her away.

Congress Adjourns
Both houses of congress adjourned at once on the news of the death, and high officials immediately noted official and personal expressions of deep sympathy.

A multitude of prominent men of the nation over and from humble homes as well as flooding into the White House today.

Condolences and flowers came from the Washington slums. A bill for the elimination of the slum district and the improvement of alleys, drafted at Mrs. Wilson's request, was passed by the senate, and the house is expected to take similar action.

Flags at Half-Mast
All flags in the city are flying at half-mast. The gates to the White House are closed and policemen patrol the grounds. Administrative departments continued at work today, but the White House engagement list was canceled. A bow of crepe on the main door of the executive mansion was visible from the street.

Secretary to the President
Tumulty has issued an announcement that the funeral will be held Monday from the White House. It will be private.

President is Haggard
The president's face wore a haggard look today, and he is suffering from nervousness due to the great shock of the death.

He was at his office for a few minutes clearing up urgent business. He bore up under his grief bravely, and attended to his duties with a dignity that won him the admiration and respect of the few who saw him.

His three daughters, Mrs. W. G. McAdoo, Mrs. Francis B. Sayre and Miss Margaret Wilson, are uncontrollable in their grief over the loss of their mother. The happy family life of the White House and the great love of the daughters for the mother, who was always a companion for them, has often been marked at the capital.

Thinks of Husband
The break in the family ties has marred their complete happiness. Remembering their mother's great concern for the president and his many problems, the daughters united in consoling him in his sorrow.

To the very last Mrs. Wilson's thought went to her husband. "Promise me," she whispered faintly to Dr. Cary Grayson, "that if I go you will take care of my husband."

The president and his daughters were notified of the approaching end, and bled tearfully at the bedside. Dr. Grayson and a nurse were in the room. Just outside were Secretary McAdoo, Francis B. Sayre and Secretary Tumulty.

Wilson on His Knees
Mrs. Wilson began to sink rapidly at 1 o'clock, but was still conscious. The president and his daughters were kneeling silently in their grief, and were left alone for a time in their sorrow.

Then they were led gently away. Secretary Tumulty announced the death in the executive offices, and work stopped. His official business ended, and officials showed deep emotion at the announcement.

Relatives are arriving on every train today. Wilson Howe, the president's nephew, came on an early train. Prof. Stockton Axson, Mrs. Wilson's brother-in-law, is expected either today or early tomorrow.

WHOLE FAMILY MAY GO HOME TO FIGHT
A messenger boy walked into the importing house of John Vittucci Co., 67 Western av., and asked for W. Fenner.

A slim, dark, pleasant-faced man responded and took the telegram eagerly. For several days he has been expecting word from his two brothers, who were en route to the United States from their homeland, Switzerland. They were intending to come for a prolonged visit to the two brothers here—the one at Vittucci's and John Fenner at the Geneva bar.

Fenner opened the telegram, and this is what he read:
"Arrived safely in New York Monday. Return to Switzerland Saturday on account of the war."
Fenner has been over from Switzerland six years, but his love for his country is as strong as ever. He wired right back for his brothers, and that they may be here too. He is a surgeon in the Swiss army. He feels it his duty to go back and help protect his country if it becomes embroiled in the big fight.

TIMBER BURNS

A million feet of timber has been sacrificed to a forest fire in the Snoqualmie district, near Hazel, Snohomish county, say reports received by Supervisor S. G. Smith.

TO HAVE LIGHT

Auburn is to have a \$60,000 plant for fuel and light gas. The city council has granted the franchise for operation to the Auburn Gas Co., represented by J. L. Veach of Auburn.

3 DIE IN FLAMES

EVERETT, Aug. 7.—A short rain storm yesterday temporarily checked the forest fires in Snohomish county.

PORT TOWNSEND, Aug. 7.—W. D. Thomas, a Leland farmer, was struck by a falling tree while fighting a forest fire and badly injured. The Lindstrom shingle mill on Discovery bay and a quantity of shingle bolts in Leland valley have been wiped out by the flames.

PERNIE, B. C., Aug. 7.—Three men have been burned thus far in the British Columbia forest fires this season. Twenty miles square has been burned over since the fires started.

EXPECT ATTACK ON MEXICO CITY

MEXICO CITY, Aug. 7.—Preparations are being rushed today to resist a constitutional attack.

The activity followed official advice received by President Carranza that Gen. Carranza had rejected Carral's plan for transferring the government and had broken off all negotiations. Government officials expected an attack on the capital.

It is reported that the U. S. had suggested that Carral surrender to the constitutionalists on the latter's terms.

LONDON GETS PEEP AT WAR PRISONERS

LONDON, Aug. 7.—London commuters waiting for trains at the Victoria station saw a bit of real war byplay last night when 85 German prisoners were marched past guarded by West Kent soldiers carrying fixed bayonets. They were naval reservists taken from German ships and held as prisoners of war. The Germans seemed unconcerned.
