RE AUTO-DITCHED; 2 JOYRIDERS IN ETERNITY!

The death which awaits automobilists at a curve on Duwamish av., near The Meadows, claimed two new victims early Sunday morning. A car with five passengers hurtled over the steep embankment and was wrecked.

J. Vanier Eichbaum, 36, manager of the International Steam Pump Co., 152 36th av. N., and Mrs. Susie Q. E. Hughes were killed when Eichbaum's car crashed off the road, near the same spot where eight people were hurt last week. A man and two other women escaped with minor injuries.

GOING AT TERRIFIC PACE
Sergt. W. J. Alvey, who investigated, reported the machine apparently was being driven at a terrific rate of speed, as the car skidded 175 feet before the fall.

Miss Laura Hunter, a sister of Mrs. Hughes; Mrs. Josephine Ayers, of Portland, Ore., who has been visiting Miss Hunter at her home, 3707 East Highland drive, and C. R. Willis, of the General Electric Co., Portland, were the other passengers, guests of Eichbaum. Miss Hunter was found by officials near the scene of the tragedy, wandering in a dazed condition. She was taken to the city hospital and later sent home.

MAKES REPORT TO POLICE
Willis, after taking Mrs. Ayers to her home in a taxicab, made a complete report to the police. He said the automobile drive with Eichbaum and the three women began early in the evening along the boulevard. After dinner at the Firloch club, on Lake Washington, they stopped for a while at the Rathskeller. It was about 10 o'clock, he said, when they started out Duwamish av.

"I had a drink or two at dinner, but Eichbaum declined to take any, as he was driving the car," said Willis. "The curve in the road is a sharp one, and I am sure he did not see it in time to avoid the accident. I believe a tire blowout made the car skid."

Willis said he found Mrs. Ayers wandering aimlessly near the scene, trying to climb a fence. He obtained a taxi and brought her to town, notified the coroner and reported to the police. He has been at the New Washington hotel.

Mrs. Charlotte Eichbaum and two sons, John, 4, and Vanier, 8, survive Eichbaum. They have been visiting Eichbaum's sister, Mrs. Charles Smith, at Gearhart, Ore.

BABE LEFT MOTHERLESS
Mrs. Hughes was divorced a few months ago from her husband, G. E. Hughes, who is in Mexico.

An 8-month-old baby is left without a mother as the result of her death.

George Butzer, a broker of Juneau, Alaska, who was hurt when Arthur Carmody's car plunged off the road at the same place on Duwamish av. last Thursday morning, probably will die. He is at the Providence hospital.

BILLIE DIDN'T COME; SHE'S DEAD

"Billie—I am sick. Will you come in room 52 and see me? I was once your wife, so for old times sake, come in and see me. Yours ever, "WINIFRED."

It is written on a scrap of yellow paper. It's at the coroner's office. Nearby lies Winifred Lamme, 26, the girl who wrote it. She is dead.

The girl, who is the daughter of Mrs. William G. Metcalf, 7314 12th av. S., went to the Erwin hotel, 1533 1/2 Second av., and rented a room yesterday afternoon. A little later she slipped the note under the door of the room occupied by Bernard Melvin and "Bill" Spencer. She was found dead last night, death evidently caused by suicide, brought about by hanging herself.

Both men are said to have denied they were ever married to the girl.

GEORGE SLAPS HUGH'S WRIST

Hugh C. Wallace, whose press agents had him named for several cabinet positions and ambassadorships under Wilson, will be given a banquet tonight at Tacoma. But will George E. KNUDSEN RECALL FALLS SHORT

The first check of County Auditor Phelps indicates the Knudsen recall has failed by a shortage of 484 names on the recall petition, some 800 names having been withdrawn from the original lists.

The official count will be announced after a recheck. There were 15,785 signatures required to put the recall election into effect.

The Hamilton recall check is still being held up by the supreme court taking an injunction matter under advisement.

CANAL RATES ANNOUNCED

Lumber shippers will save \$4 a thousand on rough 30-foot lengths and less, by shipping through the canal, instead of "around the Horn," according to an announcement by W. R. Grace & Co. The old price was \$17, the new \$13. An increase of \$1 for every thousand will be charged for lengths from 30 to 40 feet. From 40 to 50 feet, \$17 will be assessed. These rates are not necessarily permanent.

WOMAN FILES FOR CONGRESS

OLYMPIA, Wash., Aug. 10.—The filing of Mrs. Cora Cryderman, of Blanchard, for the progressive nomination for congress in the Second district, and of Louis J. Kreger, of Tacoma, for United States senator on the progressive ticket, featured the last day's filings here. Mrs. Cryderman is the first woman in the state to seek congressional honors. Kreger's filing makes a fourth candidate in the race, and necessitates second choice voting in the progressive primaries. The other candidates are Ole Hanson, Seattle; J. A. Falconer, Everett; and A. V. Fawcett, Tacoma. John H. Dege, Tacoma, a new democratic candidate for senator, filed Saturday.

BURIEN MUNICIPAL LINE PAYS

Everybody likes to ride on the Lake Burien municipal line, apparently. It carried \$275.91 above all expenses. That's pretty good, considering that it is fed by a hostile line.

The list of people and firms receiving the port warden's monthly report was burned, along with other papers. As it contained 120 names, it is difficult to replace them from memory. Port Warden A. A. Paysee has requested that all persons who received the report write to his office of the fact.

ENTIRE NATION MOURNING WILSON FUNERAL IS SIMPLE

WASHINGTON, Aug. 10.—Brief and simple funeral services were held over the body of Mrs. Woodrow Wilson at 2 o'clock in the east room of the White House. Selections were read from the 15th chapter of First Corinthians and the 14th chapter of St. John. Then followed short prayers and a benediction.

Grouped around the casket during the service were President Wilson and his three daughters, several relatives of Mrs. Wilson, the senate and house committees and the members of the cabinet and their wives. The following prayer was offered by the Rev. Sylvester Beach, a lifelong friend of the Wilson family:

"We bless Thee, for Thy grace, which kindled her heart with love for Thy dear name and enabled her to fight the good fight, endure patiently unto the end and to obtain victory. We magnify Thy name for the gift of this precious life, for Thine image was graciously reflected in her service and character; for her love so tender, loyalty so unflinching, devotion to duty, Christ-like unselfishness, self-forgetfulness, service to others and her charity. We know that her going is but translation to higher and holier ministries in that life where Thy servants serve Thee forever."
