MAN WHO HIRES TRAINS WITH NO MONEY OBJECTS TO GOING TO ASYLUM; SAYS HE'LL FIGHT

The case of Thomas W. Shackelford, who is charged with insanity by his brother, former Judge John A. Shackelford, of Tacoma, was continued again yesterday afternoon, at the request of the accused, who said he wished to call more witnesses in his behalf.

Judge Shackelford says his brother persists in hiring special trains when he is unable to pay for them and is always under the delusion that he is about to embark in immense business enterprises, making it necessary for him to employ a train of stenographers and assistants.

Demands a Record.
A little group of men, including the two Shackelfords, gathered in the private chambers of Superior Judge Everett Smith at the court house yesterday afternoon for the purpose of settling the case.

Shackelford had considerable to say in his own behalf, and either commented or objected to everything everybody else said.

He demanded a stenographer, but Judge Smith thought it unnecessary.

"All right," said Shackelford. "I'm insane, of course, and don't know if this is regular, but if I'm to be railroaded to the asylum I want some record of it."

He Says He'll Fight.
"I want time to bring in business

men of this town to show that I am not insane. As a matter of fact, I think I am just about as sane as you, Judge Everett Smith. And I want to notify you that I shall fight this thing to the limit. I'll carry it to the supreme court if necessary.

"I want to keep out of the insane asylum if I can, naturally. I have been in before and I know what it is. Solicitous relatives were responsible for my incarceration before. They are trying to get me in now. I know that it requires a man with a strong mind to come out of the asylum sane."

Brothers Have Argument.
Judge Shackelford asked him if he remembered promising him the day before that he would have all his witnesses in court yesterday.

"Yes, Jack, I remember that," replied the accused man. "But I had some other business to attend to."

"May I ask what that other business was, Tom?" asked Judge Shackelford.

"I very much regret to say it is none of your business," replied the other, with great heat.

Judge Smith told him he thought it would be best for him to go to the hospital at Stellacoom two or three months and rest up.

Shackelford said he objected to the fatherly attitude assumed by Judge Smith.

SEEK REASON FOR CLIMB OF PRICES HERE SEATTLE GETS ITS FIRST GIRL ELEVATOR BOY

An investigation in Seattle of the cause for the sudden alarming increase in the price of foodstuffs was begun today by Assistant District Attorney Winter S. Martin, as a result of an order for a nation-wide investigation yesterday by Attorney General McReynolds, acting in response to a letter suggesting such an investigation from President Wilson.

Martin is seeking today to list all increases on the local markets, and the cause therefor.

The increase of prices on many commodities is believed to be absolutely unwarranted.

Foodstuffs imported are necessarily subject to an increase, but the price has gone skyward on home-grown and home-manufactured necessities, such as flour.

Flour has gone up 20 cents a barrel for no apparent reason, save the flurry in wheat. And as wheat is sold in great quantities of what he stored in warehouses and scattered in freight cars across the continent.

Sugar is wholesaling at an advance of \$2 per hundred since the war started. Lemons have increased \$4.50 and \$5 per box. Butter and eggs are on the upgrade, but this is merely a normal advance incidental to the season.

According to a local dealer, practically all things sold in drug stores have soared to dizzy heights within the past few days, and although Seattle druggists have not all followed the general increase in the country, because the majority of them are stocked up for 60 days, the prices are bound to increase shortly. The increase is from 25 to 100 per cent.

HOME LIFE IN SMALL FLATS IS IMPOSSIBLE SHE SAYS; NO CURE

CHICAGO, Aug. 7.—"It's all right to talk about home economics, but what our cities need are real homes and not flats—for the modern flat is so small that there is not even room for doubt, let alone room in which to change one's mind," said Miss Lillian E. Stearns, member of the Wisconsin state library board, before the home economics conference of the General Federation of Women's Clubs. "It should be a state's prison offense to rear a child in a flat," she continued.

She did not say how families with small incomes would be able to live in better homes than they now do.

He had drawn in a fish, rebated the hook and swung the line with the idea of throwing far out. The hook caught in his lip. It was removed here.
