## OLYMPIC ATHLETE SABERS

### GERMANS; CAPTURES FLAG

LONDON, Sept. 24.—Corporal George Andrea, mentioned in the dispatches as promoted and recommended for a medal, is the French athlete who competed with Harry Porter, the American high jumper, in the London Olympic games, says the Chronicle's correspondent at Bordeaux.

Andrea, who is with the French army in Lorraine, went with six men into a village to find rooms for their officers.

In the market place was a large band of Germans, who immediately set upon them. Andrea snatched a saber from the German nearest him and killed two men with it.

He saw that his companions were dead or captured, so he grabbed a flag from the German, and putting it under his arm, raced through the village street.

Numbers of Germans followed. After sprinting a quarter of a mile he left his pursuers far behind, and later rejoined his regiment with the flag.

**TWO CAPTAINS SAVED; ONE DIES**

LONDON, Sept. 24.—Captains Nicholson and Drummond of the British cruisers Hogue and Aboukir, two of the three craft sunk by German submarines in the North sea Tuesday, were saved, it was announced by the admiralty today.

Captain Johnson of the Cressy perished.

## ALLIES CAN'T DRIVE ENEMY BACK ON AISNE

PARIS, Sept. 24.—Though the Franco-British left continued today its turning movement against the German right northeast of Paris, all efforts to drive the kaiser's troops from their entrenchments between the Oise and the Aisne have failed, the Bordeaux war office announced at 3 p. m. today.

"Despite violent attacks by the allies," said the statement, "the Germans have been able to retain the strongly entrenched positions. The allies' assaults on them continue violently.

"Along the heights of the Meuse, also, the fighting is severe."

In the Oise-Aisne region, it was said, much of the fighting was by the bayonet, the Germans resisting the allies' charges gallantly.

The allies' left, between the Oise and the Aisne, continued to repel the Teutons, it was stated, and toward Revo the allied forces had advanced somewhat, a detachment having occupied Peronne.

## NOW CHOLERA IN AUSTRIAN ARMY

VIENNA, Sept. 22.—Austria is now threatened by an epidemic of Asiatic cholera, nine cases having been reported, one of which is within an hour's ride of Vienna. The afflicted person in each case is a wounded soldier brought back from Galicia.

## NUNS ARRESTED

LONDON, Sept. 24.—Forty nuns in a German convent at Horsbeek, Belgium, were placed under arrest by Belgians after they addressed the villagers in favor of Germany, denouncing King Albert.

## REDUCE FORTS AT PRZEMYSL

PETROGRAD, Sept. 24.—Russian siege guns rushed to the front from Lemberg had reduced Przemysl's five main forts today, the war office announced.

The czar's troops were said also to have gained control of part of the main railroad to Cracow and to have occupied Chyrow Junction, putting 600 miles of Galician railroads into their hands.

They were advancing westward, said the war office, compelling the entire Austro-German line as they progressed.

The Austrians, it was stated, had been reinforced, but were unable to withstand the invaders.

## PRINCE ASKS FOR UNDERWEAR FOR TROOPS IN FIELD

BERLIN (via Rotterdam and London), Sept. 24.—Crown Prince Frederick William today telegraphed to the Zeitung Amnuttig as follows:

"Please collect and forward as early as possible woollen underwear and socks for my soldiers. Greetings."

"WILHELM, Crown Prince."

It was only a few days ago that the crown prince, who evidently has the comfort of his soldiers always in mind, telegraphed to a Berlin newspaper asking it to collect and forward tobacco and cigars for his soldiers.

## CITY OUGHT TO RUN BUS LINE, SAYS ERICKSON

Believing that the city should operate the bus line to secure permanent service, the council utilities committee will refer the offer of George Gunther of two buses to bring Lake Burien passengers from the terminus of the street railway to the heart of the city.

Councilman Erickson is willing to accept the buses if the city is allowed to operate them.

Unless that is done, he says, Gunther could stop running them at any time.

Erickson would take over the machines and pay Gunther for them.

## GERMAN VESSEL FIRES ON MADRAS

LONDON, Sept. 24.—Entering the harbor of Madras, India, at 9:30 a. m. today, the German cruiser Emden fired nine shells into the city, according to an official announcement.

One shot struck among the oil tanks and set two of them on fire. The telegraph office, the Seamen's club and a number of trucks were also hit.

The harbor forts replied, and the Emden withdrew.

The affair lasted 15 minutes.

## Today's Healthgram

A physician gives the following instructions for checking nosebleed: Grasp the nostrils with the thumb and index finger. Apply the pressure as close to the bony part of the nose as possible. Drop the head gently forward. Breathe through the mouth. The pressure may reach the bleeding vessel. If not, the nose will fill with blood, which will clot in a few minutes.

After the clot has had time to form (10 to 15 minutes), gradually release the pressure. Leave the clot undisturbed for an hour or more.

## HAMILTON, BRUISER

### AUSTRIA NOT YET WHIPPED BY RUSSIANS

LIFE HAMILTON, county commissioner, COWARDLY BRUISER. This was, in effect, the verdict of the jury in Judge Ronald's court yesterday. J. R. McIntyre, whom Hamilton struck on the head without provocation or warning, and then kicked him, was awarded a verdict of \$2,500 damages.

The jury was out three hours, but the only question discussed, it is said, was the amount of damages to be awarded. The original complaint asked for \$10,000 damages.

With the jury finding against Hamilton, it practically also convicted the entire Hamilton gang in the commissioners' office, who, seeing David McKenzie maltreated by Dr. Richardson, and McIntyre knocked into semi-consciousness by Hamilton, grinned and refused to stop the brutal spectacle in the commissioners' office.

The jury's verdict is a straw indicating what the people's verdict should be, and will be, on November 3. WIPE OUT THE HAMILTON GANGSTERS.

## HANSON INVADES SEN. JONES' HOME TOWN; CHALLENGES JONES TO DEBATE ON LORIMER

NORTH YAKIMA, Wash., Sept. 24.—In spite of an organized effort to break up his speech, Ole Hanson, progressive candidate for the United States senate amid the jeers and cheers of 4,000 people, yesterday afternoon at the state fair here challenged Senator Wesley LORIMER Jones to come before the people of this state and defend William Lorimer, who was expelled from the senate for buying his seat, Judge Archibald of Pennsylvania, who was impeached as a grafter and disqualified for life from holding office, and Senator Stephenson of Wisconsin, who was also charged with purchasing his office.

Jones had voted for Lorimer and Archibald, and sidestepped the vote on Stephenson.

Try to Break Up Meeting

North Yakima is Jones' home town. Hanson's speech practically divided the audience in two camps. While the Jones men shouted "Shut up," there were just as many leather-lunged admirers who shouted "Go on, go on, Ole."

One Jones man yelled: "I paid 50 cents to get in here."

Hanson took a half dollar from his pocket and threw it to the disturber.

"It's worth 50 cents," he remarked. "to get you out."

The crowd roared.

When Hanson demanded the right of free speech and asked the disturbers to proclaim their names in order that the state might know who were afraid of free discussion, a hush fell over the audience.

Challenges Jones

Facing the immense audience, which completely packed the grandstand and the track, Hanson said: "I challenge any man here to rise and defend the Lorimer vote. I challenge Senator Jones to tour the state with me and prove the innocence of Lorimer. Let Jones defend him, if he can, and let the people of this state decide whether Jones voted for a crooked politician or not."

In a fighting mood, Hanson made a plea for honesty in public office.

"You cannot get good public service from crooks," he said, "and you cannot get good service when public officials defend crooks."

Hanson then discussed his plan for state development and declared he was glad to note that even Senator Jones endorsed it.

Hanson left here last night for Seattle, where he will speak on Beacon Hill Thursday evening.

## SUFFRAGE GIRLS ARE MIGHTY BUSY

For political activity, the day's honors belong to Miss Margaret P. Whittemore and Miss Anna McCue, the representatives of the Congressional Union for Woman Suffrage. They have put on a burst of speed that makes the busiest candidate green with envy.

At noon today they spoke at the Good Eats cafeteria, to a meeting called by the Women's Progressive league.

At 2 o'clock this afternoon Miss McCue was to address the Women's State Republican club, in the Alaska building.

Tonight she speaks at the Beacon Hill schoolhouse. Hanson lived on Beacon Hill for years. When he first came here he opened a little grocery store there.

His neighbors tendered him a practically unanimous nomination for the legislature in 1908, and tonight they will pour out an masse to greet him.

## ROUMANIA TO GET INTO WAR

BUCHAREST, Sept. 24.—Roumanian participation in the war was considered practically certain today. This view prevailed following a cabinet reorganization of a basis placing the military party in control.

The king was said to have agreed to mobilization. It was believed the country would be on a war footing within a week.

The kingdom will join forces with the Anglo-France-Russian-Serb-Montenegro alliance, and the expectation is that the military forces' first act will be to invade the Austro-Hungarian province of Transylvania, which the Roumanians are anxious to acquire.

The king is strongly pro-German. He has family and financial interests in Germany. Many were predicting he would abdicate if the military council persisted in its determination to declare war.

## COP IS WOUNDED

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 24.—Patrolman R. V. Murray was near death today of a bullet wound inflicted by John Hermann, whom he sought to arrest for threatening the life of a rival for the affections of a woman.

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## Honeymoon Trip

BERLIN, Sept. 24.—The blowing up of three British cruisers in the North Sea by the German submarine U-9 was in the nature of a honeymoon submarine celebration for Lieut. Weddigen, commander of the submarine. While his craft was undergoing repairs Weddigen was married to the Shetland Islands and was married, returning to his command the following day, and a few days later going into action.

## AUSTRIA NOT YET WHIPPED BY RUSSIANS

PETROGRAD, Sept. 24.—Skirmishing was in progress today between the Russians and Austrians at points beyond Przemysl, on the road to Cracow.

The Austrians held positions at Paezow, Dynow and farther to the westward.

They had rushed their second line to the front, and presented a more formidable appearance than at any time since the Russian invasion began.

The Russians, too, had been heavily reinforced, and the war office declared the situation excellent.

## EUROPE BUYS WHEAT HERE

Due to lower prices prevailing in the Northwest, compared with Chicago, English and other European buyers are said to have purchased 5,000,000 bushels of wheat in Washington, and an equal amount in Oregon, within the last few days.

The wheat, according to reports, is to be shipped through the Panama canal to the open ports of Europe.

Portland and Puget sound buyers are declared to have been purchasing secretly to prevent a sudden rise in the market.

## AUSTRIA LOSES THREE VESSELS

ROME, Sept. 24.—Two Austrian torpedo boats and a destroyer have been sunk by mines off the Dalmatian coast, according to a Trieste dispatch to the Corriere della Sera.

## ENTHUSIASM UNCHECKED, SAYS BERLIN

BERLIN, via The Hague, Sept. 24.—"Despite the hardships they have suffered through unfavorable weather conditions, the German troops' enthusiasm," announced the war office today, "remains unchecked."

"They are fighting magnificently in France, where they have repulsed numerous attacks in force."

"The allies' center has been compelled to retire at a number of points and their attempt to envelop the German right has failed, various assaults in this quarter having been beaten back with heavy loss."

## BRITISH LAND TO HELP JAPS

TOKIO, Sept. 24.—That British infantry had landed at Lao Shan bay to help the Japanese in their land operations against the Kiaochow Germans was confirmed today.

The British troops, who recently embarked from Tien-Tsin, were commanded by Brig. Gen. Nathaniel Barnardiston.

It was stated that a general attack on Kiaochow was expected the latter part of the month.

## GERMANS RETIRE

LONDON, Sept. 24.—The Germans are slowing retiring along the line in northern France, under pressure of the allies' army, after doing all the damage possible to the country through which they are moving, according to the correspondent of the London Times at the front.
