

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JAMES A. PATTEN
Former "King" of Chicago Wheat Pit. Just Returned From Europe
It looks to me as though the war will not be over by January 1. The Germans are very stubborn and will not give up until they are thoroughly beaten.

In England I had opportunity of talking with leading statesmen and military authorities, and they were unanimous that two years was the shortest time in which the defeated party in the European war could be so thoroughly exhausted as to yield to any terms the victors might impose.

America should put its house in order. The capitalist class still denies us the right to exercise the war-making power by direct vote of the people. We must capture this last right. Every cannon shot in Europe is an admonition to us to move.

SHAILER MATHEWS

The great need of the world is not merely a cessation of the present terrible war, but the establishment of peace between the embattled nations on such a basis as will insure the healing of the wounds of conflict, and the renewing of the bonds of brotherhood.

JUDGE ELBERT H. GARY
Chairman Board of Directors, U. S. Steel Corporation
The instruments of destruction, the methods of using them, and the facilities for moving armies have greatly changed, and the destruction of life will be so large and rapid that it would seem the war must be sooner ended than in former times. I hope the war will not continue many months because the actual war cost is conservatively placed at \$40,000,000 in money, besides the thousands of men killed and wounded.

WILLIAM H. SLOANE
Professor of History, University of Columbia, Author of "Life of Napoleon," and for Years a Resident of Germany and Close Student of Diplomatic Affairs.
Suppose that the Germans should be able to make successive victorious dashes, first in the east, then in the west, backward and forward, which is not so preposterous as appears on the face of it, because of comparatively easy means of transportation; then leadership would be hers, and France would be a minor power for many years to come.

Probably peace would come more quickly if neither side should be victorious, but for the moment I think the agreement among the allies is a very portentous thing, as far as the duration of the war is concerned.

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DR. LYMAN ABBOTT
Editor of the Outlook
The services of President Wilson as mediator will not be accepted by any of the parties involved until the fundamental questions at issue are settled, and settled peace would only lead to another and still more terrible war. I believe that the defeat of Germany will be its salvation, for it will be the overthrow of the spirit of militarism. The campaign of the allies will end for Western Europe. Dr. Lyman Abbott the divine right of the armed man. It is not unreasonable to hope that the war will result in establishing true constitutional government in Germany.

HUGO MUENSTERBERG
Professor of Psychology, Harvard University
If Germany had been left alone it would have gone into this struggle with the certainty of success. . . . But now there must be a miracle. Germany must win against the world if the balance of Eastern and Western powers is to be maintained.

CHAMP CLARK
Speaker of the House of Representatives
So long as the countries at war are able to fight as well as they are fighting now, I don't think any proposal of peace will have much effect.

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
