GIRL TAKES BLAME FOR BROTHER'S CRIME

PORTLAND, Oct. 6.—Margaret Thurman, 17, sister of Frank Thurman, the young amateur bandit, who was shot while attempting to hold up a street car Sunday night, was in-consolable today, because she said if it had not been for her, her brother would not have tried a career of crime.

The girl told District Attorney Evans yesterday that Frank, though out of work, had been keeping her in school. It was to get more money, she declared, that he had tried to rob the car. "If he dies, I'll kill myself," she wept.

GILL A "DEVIL IN OWN HOME TOWN"

Mayor Gill had a lot of fun talking to the pretty girls selling things at the St. James' cathedral Catholic fair, at the Perfecta cafeteria, Third and James, which opened last evening. Once in a while, when a particularly winsome maiden smiled particularly winsomely at him, he bought—it didn't much matter what it was, be it doll, lace stuff or pastry. Also he told the assembled hundreds that he was glad he'd come, and that spending money on the fair diverted it to channels where he knew it would be expended for worthy charitable purposes.

INVOLVES CITY'S RIGHT TO RUN LINE

Cities have no right to buy or operate street railways outside of the city limits, according to an opinion of Scott Z. Henderson, assistant attorney general, given to the state bureau of inspection.

Henderson's opinion directly affects the operation by the city of Seattle of the Lake Burien line, which lies partly outside of the city limits. Mayor Gill believes an act of the legislature will be necessary to ratify any budget allowance for the Lake Burien line.

If Henderson's contention is right, the city light and water plants will also be prevented from extending their service outside of the city.

TAHOMA SURVIVORS ON WAY HERE

With the survivors of the Tahoma aboard, the steamer Cordova, of the Alaska Steamship Co., and the geodetic survey steamer Patterson landed at Unalaska Sunday. The Tahoma's crew will be brought to Seattle by the revenue cutters Bear and Manning.

CLAYPOOL WON'T BE RECEIVER

OLYMPIA, Oct. 6.—Because his son was hurt in a football game, Judge C. E. Claypool will not take the receivership of the Olympia Bank and Trust Co. and the State Bank of Tenino, a job offered him by Judge Chapman of Tacoma, and which he had intended taking. Judge Claypool says his son's illness will prevent him from giving immediate attention to the banks. The judge was to resign to take the receivership. His term expires in January.

GRAVES URGES PENINSULA ROADS

Construction of roads is the first imperative need toward the development of the Olympic peninsula, said Henry S. Graves, chief forester of the United States, at a dinner given in his honor at the Washington hotel by the Seattle Chamber of Commerce yesterday. While others, beginning with M. J. Carrigan, down the line, seemed to favor total abolition of the forest reserve, Graves declared he did not believe it wise to drive out Uncle Sam.

"But I do believe," he said, "that Uncle Sam should handle that country in a business-like way, borrow money and build roads into the Olympics. I don't believe it would be wise to dump the timber of that forest on the market now, when there is already an oversupply. One of the first problems is to get two-handed men ready to do hard work, to take up the log-end-off lands and stay there. The construction of roads would be a step toward the attainment of that end."

ALLEGED BRIBER CAN'T GET BAIL

Hartig Norman, former deputy sheriff, under arrest on a charge of attempting to buy the list of government witnesses in the Tape case, waived a hearing yesterday before U. S. Commissioner J. C. Whitlock, and was admitted to \$5,000 bail, which he failed to furnish. The grand jury, which convenes October 15, will consider his case.

Norman is an old character with the police. He has been arrested three times within the past four years—once for seduction, once as a disorderly person, and again for petit larceny.

DEATH OF CHING GOW A MYSTERY

The police are divided today on whether Ching Gow, the Chinese suspected of murdering Lam Kong, government witness in the Frank H. Tape Chinese smuggling case, committed suicide or was murdered. Motorcycle Patrolman Frank Olmstead, who, with Officer William G. Witzke, was the first white man to examine the body hanging from a door casing in a Japanese lodging house Sunday morning, declares Ching took his own life.

He says the Chinaman was completely and carefully dressed.

A post mortem examination yesterday of the stomach failed to reveal poison.

SENATE TAKES A DAY OFF

WASHINGTON, Oct. 6.—There was no session of the senate today, the democratic members meeting in a war caucus. This war tax is the only measure blocking adjournment of the senate.

GOVERNMENT ORDERS DIRIGIBLES

NEW YORK, Oct. 6.—Local airship builders admit the government has ordered two dirigible balloons as a result of developments in the European war. After investigating conditions abroad, Sam Reber, U. S. A., three weeks ago ordered the purchase of dirigibles.

The extent of the probable shortage in Paris gowns is indicated by the fact that 6,000 dressmakers have applied for work there since the war started.
