LEADS SEATTLE CIGAR STAND GIRLS IN A CAMPAIGN TO HOLD THEIR JOBS

Shall Clara Christie lose her job?

Clara has been employed at the Butler hotel cigar stand for about five years. Her services have been eminently satisfactory to the Butler. But she may get fired anyhow.

The Butler hotel won't discharge her. The State Welfare commission has that matter under consideration.

Not only Miss Christie, but every girl employed at a cigar stand hotel or restaurant would lose her job if the recommendation of the recent minimum wage conference is accepted by the welfare commission.

The girls are, of course, indignant. Miss Christie is at the head of a committee that will appear at Olympia before State Labor Commissioner Olson and the Welfare commission to combat the threatened confiscation of their employment.

"There is nothing wrong in selling cigars and tobaccos at hotel stands," declares Miss Christie. "There are telephone operators at hotels. If it is wrong for us to work in hotels, then it is also wrong for telephone girls, and for chambermaids, and for restaurant help."

"Furthermore," and Miss Christie's eyes twinkled, "if there is any uplifting to be done, why not pay some attention to the manure girls? They're always holding hands with their customers. We don't do anything like that."

All the cigar stand saleswomen admit their ages to be over 21. "They contend that if the commission makes it a rule not to allow the employment of girls under age at cigar stands, all interests will be sufficiently safeguarded."

The Sun publishers acknowledged debts aggregating \$300,000 in court when the receiver was asked for by G. E. Parkhurst, who holds the paper's note for \$2,000. In addition to its heavy indebtedness, the paper's daily loss is approximately \$300, or more than \$7,000 per month.

In less than two years' time, the paper has used up all of its receipts and incurred liabilities of \$300,000, besides. Most of these debts are secured only by notes signed by the publishers, one of whom is John P. Hartman, who went into bankruptcy last Saturday, with liabilities of \$200,000.

LONDON, Dec. 17.—Three steamships have been sunk by mines in English waters in the last few hours, it was announced today. The Elterwater was lost off Flamborough Head, and six of its crew are missing.

An unidentified vessel went down under similar conditions in the same locality, its crew and passengers escaping in lifeboats. The freight steamer Princess Olga hit a mine and sank six miles off Hartlepool last night. Members of the Olga's crew, rescued, said they saw a German steamship laying mines near the spot where their vessel was blown up.

20,000 KIDDIES STARVE IN OHIO

CLEVELAND, O., Dec. 17.—Unless relief on a large scale comes to the Ohio coal-mining strike region within seven days, thousands of striking miners and their families will face starvation at Christmas time.

SAFETY-AT-SEA PACT RATIFIED

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17.—The senate has ratified the international convention for safety of life at sea, signed January 2 at London, by many of the leading nations. The senate reserves the right to exact higher standards than those prescribed by the treaty for the health and safety on American vessels.

ARCHER DISMISSED



WAR NEWS

TURKS ARE ANGRY AT VON DER GOLTZ

ATHENS, Dec. 16.—(Delayed.)—Field Marshal Von Der Goltz, the German soldier who has assumed charge of the sultan's troops, will be extremely lucky if he ever gets out of Turkey alive, according to advice received today from Salonika.

The feeling is spreading throughout the Ottoman empire that Germany dragged the Turks into the war against their own interests, simply because the kaiser thought it would pay him to do so.

As the most important German in Turkey, it is asserted Von Der Goltz is looked on as typifying this anti-Turkish policy, and it is reported that Turkey high in Constantinople government are determined to eliminate him.

CABINET WILL TALK IT OVER

LONDON, Dec. 17.—The British cabinet met today to discuss the German naval raid on the English east coast.

SERVIANS CUTTING DOWN AUSTRIAN ARMY

NISH, Dec. 17.—"During the battle of Tarlak, for possession of the heights dominating Belgrade," announced the war office today, "the Serbians captured another 10,000 Austrians, bringing the total number of our prisoners up to 80,000. The entire strength of the Austrian Southern army operating against us is now only 30,000."

AUSTRIANS CLAIM SUCCESSES

VIENNA, Dec. 17.—Continued Austrian successes in Galicia and the south of Russian Poland were claimed in an official statement issued by the war office here today.

RUSSIA PREPARES FOR BLOODY BATTLE

PETROGRAD, Dec. 17.—That it will take the bloodiest battle the Russo-German campaign has yet seen to settle the pending issue in Central Poland was the opinion among experts here today. The Slavs were preparing to meet the situation with an overwhelming force.

A desperate fight is in progress between the Austro-German troops and the Russians' extreme left, in Southern Poland, and Galicia.

ANNOUNCE TURKISH VICTORY

CONSTANTINOPLE (via Berlin and London), Dec. 17.—Defeat by the Turks of the Russian forces in Transcaucasia, after a series of battles lasting several days, was claimed in a war office statement issued today.

82 KILLED IN GERMAN'S RAID; SHELL WIPES OUT BIG FAMILY

LONDON, Dec. 17.—Calm, deadly anger was the prevailing sentiment throughout England today, following yesterday's raid by German cruisers on the east coast.

The German vessels escaped in the mist.

Latest lists placed the number of killed by the bombardment of Hartlepool, Scarborough and Whitby at 75 civilians and 7 soldiers and the wounded at 267 civilians and 14 soldiers.

The soldiers were in the Hartlepool fortress, at the mouth of the River Tees, where the only shots were fired in response to the German shells.

At Hartlepool the majority of the victims were women and children including 15 school boys killed.

Many of the wounded will die.

The London and provincial newspapers are a unit today in supporting the government's determination not to permit the attack to result in any redistribution of the British land and sea forces for a more effectual protection of the coast, because it would interfere with the main campaign.

Scarborough reported 18 killed there, including eight women and three children. The wounded at the same place were placed at 150.
