EVENING IN THE TRENCHES; REPORTER-SOLDIER TELLS ABOUT FIGHTING A NIGHT

This is the fourth article of a series of narratives describing life in the trenches, written by Phil Rader, former San Francisco newspaperman, who is now a member of the French foreign legion.

LONDON, March 10.—The most picturesque and weird hour of all the life in the trenches is the time between sunset and the fall of darkness.

The gold in the western sky turns to red, the shadows lengthen and the gulch of the trench is filled with the deepening darkness of early night.

The darkness of the trench is broken now and then by the flare of a cigarette, bayonet protruding above the trench wall and catching the dying glare of the sun's light.

Machine Guns Work Only at Night

As the darkness grows deeper, you catch a glimpse of a sharp point of light on a distant hill which flickers in the telegraph code, a message from a French battery to its comrade many miles away.

They are talking of some new plot to kill human beings. There is a rattle of rifles and their quick flashes, first at one point in our trench and then in another.

From afar comes the putt-putt-putt of a machine gun. Nightfall is the machine gun's hour. During the hours of daylight the machine gunmen have their ranges and fixed their aims, and now, in the darkness, when their precious guns are safest from sharpshooters, they flare out their result of the day's work.

From distant corners of the compass comes the roar of deep-throated batteries.

The stars shine all the brighter because you are gazing at them from the bottom of your black trench.

Night Lights Sent Aloft for Protection

Suddenly the sky is bisected by an arc of sparks, terminated by a beautiful glare of pure white light, which transforms night into day for the space of many seconds. It is a night light sent up by the enemy so that they can see what we are doing.

After the white light fades, the night seems darker than ever. The bullets whistle and shriek overhead almost incessantly.

All night it will be like this—noise and light noises and lights. The night is filled with danger and surprises. Daylight charges

are never made; it is in the night time that the Germans leave their trenches, or we leave ours, to run ahead into hand-hand stabbing affray with the enemy.

The gray of morning is a sight of good cheer. "The juggler" Tells When Morning Has Come

In our trench we measure the morning light by whether or not we can see the legs of "the juggler" fluttering in the wind.

"The juggler" was the corpse of a Frenchman, which for six weeks lay some 500 feet in our trenches on his back, with his arms outstretched, a canvas water bucket clutched in each hand, his legs sticking up into the air, in a spot so deadly from rifle fire that no one could reach him.

The dead man lay there through the nights and days. "The French called this grotesque heap "the juggler" because they remembered that Japanese athletes stretched themselves out in this manner, and they had tossed and tossed about in the air with their feet.

When the rags on the legs of "the juggler" were plainly seen then we knew that morning had come, another night of madness had passed, and we might sleep until the night lights and the night noises broke out again at sunset.

LABOR WILL INITIATE BILL TO GIVE "FIRST AID" TO WORKMEN

President Marsh, of the State Federation of Labor, Wednesday announced that an initiative bill, providing for a true "first aid" for injured workmen, will be filed with the secretary of state as soon as the laws permit.

Under the constitution, new initiative measures cannot be filed until after January, 1916, to be voted on at the regular election in November, 1916.

At the last election, the "first aid" initiative bill, approved by the labor organizations, was defeated by a narrow margin after the governor declared he would appoint a commission of employers and employees to draft an impartial measure.

The governor's commission drafted the measure, but the legislature ignored it.

Marsh is confident the labor federation's "first aid" bill will carry by a big vote next year.

LISTER VETOES KLEEB BILL OLYMPIA, March 24.—De-

claring that the workmen and the state in general are better off without any "first aid" bill than the Kleeb measure provided that the employers and workmen contribute in equal amounts to the fund to provide medical attendance for injured workmen, but that the employers shall have charge of the fund. It also provided a 10-day waiting period before any compensation may be paid.

It also allowed the employers to contract for physicians' services, if they so desired. Small employers, unable to do so, would have to furnish a cash bond with the state industrial insurance commission.

The measure also provides that for alien workmen the measure of compensation should be only one-half the allowance for American workmen.

The governor objects to each of the provisions, and says the last section put a premium on the employment of foreigners.

LISTER DISPOSES OF ALL MEASURES

OLYMPIA, March 20.—Gov. Lister has completed consideration of the legislative bills by disposing of the last six measures Tuesday.

He vetoed the Kleeb first aid bill, allowed the capitol bonds bill to become law without his signature, and signed four other measures, including the extra appropriation of \$12,000 for legislative expenses, though he declared in his message that the 1915 session proved to be the most extravagant of several legislatures in the past.

TRANSFER STATIONS

The bill will come up in the council Monday.
