The artist has placed strips across portions of the faces, to make the task more difficult. Each of the photographs is an excellent likeness of the player, and chosen because it is the best.

The caps of one club have been purposely placed on the player of some other, because most of the fans would recognize the caps of the Athletics, or the Pirates, or the Giants, or Tigers, or Senators. In fact, almost all the clubs wear different shaped caps.




