**MEN WHO SCOFF AT BIG NAVY ARE LIKE THOSE WHO JEERED AT NOAH**



They Didn't Think Much of Noah's Ark-Building Stunt

Why, I suspect that when Noah got the ark under way men came to him and scoffed, as they scoff at the advocate of a big navy, saying: "Why do you build this ship?" And when Noah explained that he feared an emergency ahead, I've no doubt other men shook their heads together and exclaimed: "The very building of this craft is likely to breed a bad state of mind and create trouble!" These men today tell us that if we build a navy we will bring about a war with some one by doing so.

**AMERICA'S PROBLEM MORAL ONE**

"An era of wonderful prosperity is going to visit this country during the next ten years," according to Fred B. Smith, a prominent New York business man, and famous lecturer, in an address before a noon-day luncheon served Thursday at the Y. M. C. A., at which were present over 200 of Seattle's most influential business men. Smith stated that the problem of the American people was neither economic nor political. We are the wealthiest people in the world. Our constitution and government exceed any other government. The weakness which cause so many men to go down before the temptations of a keenly competitive business life, as well as that which causes our social and industrial unrest, is purely a moral problem, he said.

**VILLA CONTROLS FOUR-FIFTHS?**

WASHINGTON, April 2.—Attempts are being made to have Mexico City declared neutral territory, putting an end to the fighting and looting in the capital. The plan includes the creation of a federal district police force, and pledging all factions to stay away from the capital. Secretary Bryan has endorsed the plan, and Gen. Villa and Zapata are understood to have declared they would agree to the proposal, providing the approval of Gen. Carranza was also obtained. In a manifesto issued by Gen. Villa, the Mexican leader states he now controls four-fifths of the country. He also announces a new cabinet and establishes himself at the head of the government.

**CHAMBER WILL OPPOSE NEW RATE**

Seattle will join in the fight to prevent the granting of an application of the transcontinental railroads that they be allowed to put in carload rates on various heavy articles now transported in large volume by water, and which makes higher rates for interior cities. The interstate commerce commission will consider the request April 12, at Washington, D. C. W. A. Mears, manager of the transportation bureau of the Chamber of Commerce, will attend and file a protest against the plan.

**POLITICIAN TAKES HIS LIFE**

FRESNO, Cal., April 2.—Financial reverses resulting from his political activities were assigned today as a reason for the suicide by poison of L. Parker Timmins, a unique figure in California public life. Timmins, it is said, was about to be appointed chief of police, to succeed T. F. Coyle, whose resignation was requested recently by the police commission. In 1901 he was appointed U. S. marshal for the Southern California district. Since then he has conducted a saloon here.

**UNIVERSITY LANDS FOR SALE**

TACOMA, April 2.—Announcement of the intention of the board of regents of the University of Washington to sell 28,500 acres of wheat land in Douglas county, held by the university, was made today by Regent John A. Rea, upon his return from a trip of inspection over the land with five other regents. The land will be sold by the state land commissioner at not less than \$10 an acre. Part of it is reached by the Great Northern railroad, and much of it has been under cultivation and has produced bumper crops.

**SUICIDE LOSES ATTRACTION**

EVERETT, April 2.—Olga Aegsetved, 18, exonerated of responsibility for the death of Bird Peterson recently, will take up nursing in Seattle, she announced today, having given up her intention to take her life. Peterson was shot, investigation disclosed, in a scuffle to wrest a revolver from Miss Aegsetved when she threatened suicide.

**SAYS HE WAS NOT A PIRATE**

LOS ANGELES, April 2.—The Los Angeles Record and its editor, George R. Young, are named as defendants in a suit on file here today on behalf of L. M. (Larry) Sullivan, alleging libel. Sullivan asks \$50,000 damages.

An article in the Record, on which the suit was based, was headed "Former Pirate Attacks Chief," and was published in connection with charges recently made against Chief of Police Sebastian.

A thief who stole 15 chickens from the roost of a Los Angeles man dropped a purse containing \$90. Some L. A. chickens come higher than that, 'tis said in Long Beach.

An Eagle Pass dispatch reads: "Piedras Negras, in the state of Coahuila, Mex., has been evacuated by the Carranzistas. A few troops will be left there, however, until the Villistas arrive." Whereupon they will retire with "drums beating and flags flying mid the salvos of the incoming enemy" to become parasites on some other village until their turn at Piedras Negras rolls round once more.
