## Cynthia Grey's LETTERS

Q.—Is the wife supposed to do all the housework, for nothing without even a little money for herself? When I ask my husband for money he tells me he earns it and has a right to spend it as he pleases. He gets what he wants. No expense is too great for him. I have been thinking that I would get a position where I would be appreciated, or where I would be at least paid for what I do. Would you do it, Miss Grey?

ALMOST DISCOURAGED.  
A.—You are perfectly justified in making some move; but you want to be sure it is the right move. Sometimes just a little tact will bring about the desired result.

There should be some definite understanding between prospective husbands and wives with regard to money matters before marriage. I believe that a large number of divorces nowadays are caused because of a disagreement between husband and wife as to finances. For no other reason than this: Woman has gradually reached the point of education where she sees the unjustness and unfairness of working all her life in her husband's home for a mere existence, and sometimes not even that, while many men seem to have the idea that a woman's work in the home is of no economic value, when, in reality, she is doing quite as much as he, if she does her work well and her home is well regulated.

Before taking the step you contemplate, however, have a talk with your husband, presenting the case as a business woman to business man, and see if he will not be more just.

Q.—I am very much troubled and I need your help and advice. I am only a very young girl, just 17, and am working. I have never worked before; but I like to have a nice place. But as is generally the case, there is something which prevents me from enjoying it as otherwise would. It is this way:

## SAY HE HAS THREE WIVES

Bigamy may be charged against D. W. Ross, a carpenter, living at 5226 42nd ave. S., following the arrival here from California of a woman who claims to be his second wife.

She gives her name as Mrs. Anna Ross, and has brought a non-support charge against Ross. It is being heard Tuesday afternoon by Justice Reah Whitehead.

Ross declares he has never seen the woman before and that he is legally married to Mrs. Victoria L. Ross, with whom he is now living. They have two children.

Mrs. Anna Ross has informed Deputy Prosecutor Palmer that Ross has another wife in Elnora, New York.

Ross declares he divorced the Elnora woman some years ago. The California Mrs. Ross says she has followed her "husband" two and a half years.

Ross was arrested by Constable Shrewsbury at a Bremerton tailoring establishment and is held in the city jail in default of \$1,000 bonds. Palmer has indicated that he intends preferring a bigamy charge against Ross as soon as the non-support case is ended.
