

Ex-Senator Aldrich Dead; Started as Grocer's Clerk

Entered Congress With \$25,000 and Came Out With Fifteen Million.



NEW YORK, April 16.—Nelson W. Aldrich, ex-senator from Rhode Island, died shortly after 9 a. m. today at his home here, 908 Fifth ave. He had been in poor health for several months, but his illness was not regarded as serious. He was 74 years old.

Aldrich acquired wealth and fame by rising through the successive steps of politics to be the one man in control of senatorial legislation.

For at least ten years, and possibly fifteen, his sway as leader of the senate was unquestioned.

His fortune has been estimated of late years at \$10,000,000 to \$15,000,000.

When he entered congress he confided to Wm. McKinley, then serving with him as fellow committeeman, that his total assets were \$25,000. This he had acquired in the grocery business.

Beginning as a grocer's clerk at \$1.37 a day, he worked up to a partnership in a Providence, R. I. firm. Meanwhile he had interested himself in Rhode Island politics.

In 1871 to 1873 he was a member of the general assembly, part of that time serving as speaker of the house of representatives.

His first appearance in Washington was as a member of the forty-sixth congress, and he was elected to the forty-seventh and forty-eighth.

Then in 1881 he came to the senate, succeeding Ambrose Burnside. He was re-elected continuously from that time on.

The foundation of Senator Aldrich's great wealth was laid when he organized a corporation which acquired valuable franchises for street car, gas, water and electric light in Providence and later for the entire state of Rhode Island.

Senator Aldrich took part in the formulation of three tariff bills, namely, the Wilson-Gorman bill, the Dingley bill and the Aldrich-Payne bill.

DUTCH STIRRED UP; STEAMER IS SENT TO BOTTOM

THE HAGUE, April 16.—With the country excited to the highest pitch of sentiment as a result of the sinking of the Dutch S. S. Katwick, Minister of Marine Rambonnet continued his probe today into what is regarded as the gravest incident, so far as Holland is concerned, since the opening of the war.

Rambonnet announced that he was satisfied the Katwick was sunk by a submarine.

He refrained from indicating the nationality of the craft, declaring the official inquiry was still in progress and that such announcement would be withheld until all facts are known.

It is admitted that the crew of the vessel was unable to state whether the submarine was British, French or German. It is generally accepted, however, that it was a German craft, and demands for drastic action have come from the Dutch press.

As the Katwick carried a cargo of grain consigned to the Dutch government, the incident is regarded as being of the utmost importance if Dutch shipping is to be assured of any protection as the war proceeds.

The Katwick is declared to have been at anchor when attacked. The vessel is said to have had all lights burning and the Dutch flag up.

MAN IS WOMAN IN EYES OF LAW; HE CAN'T MARRY

ROME, March 20.—(By mail.)—Giuseppe Sellenzi is a husky young bricklayer of 32. His beard laughs at safety razors. He is the best scrapper in his neighborhood.

Yet he can't get married because in the eyes of the Italian law he is a woman.

APOLOGIZE FOR SINKING SHIP; 'T WAS MISTAKE

LONDON, April 16.—Admission that the German commerce raider Dresden was sunk by the British squadron in neutral waters has been made today as a result of an announcement that full apology has been offered Chile for the violation of that country's neutrality.

The claims made by Berlin that the Dresden was fired upon while at anchor in Cumberland bay, Juan Fernandez Island, were supported in the note of the Chilean government of protest. The Dresden was interned when attacked, the Chilean note stated.

She was flying a flag of truce and the governor of the island had put out in a boat to explain the situation to the commander of the Glasgow when he was compelled to return by the British ship opening fire.

The Dresden's commander then ordered his vessel blown up.

Regret for the incident was expressed by the British government.

SHERIFF ON WARPATH; TAKES FALL OUT OF COMMISSIONERS

Indignant over the refusal of the county commissioners to consider his recommendations regarding the salary of Dr. D. M. Stone, county jail and stockade physician, Sheriff Hodge has addressed a letter to the citizens of King county, stating his attitude and its cause.

He has also directed a scorching letter to the county commissioners which he exposes the commission's so-called "high regard for economy," and asks that the board discontinue its bickerings and petty faultfindings and get down to business.

"The fast and loose policy which the county commissioners have assumed with regard to the bill for medical service rendered to the prisoners in my custody is monstrous," he writes to Phelps. "They refer to a budget in which I had no part in the making, and which apparently wedded to this high-sounding word 'budget' have seen fit to exercise a pinary power at their pleasure in the matter of salary adjustments.

"I have tried to impress upon you in previous communications the utter impossibility of budget allowances being proposed for the expenses of the one emergency executive office in the county, and when it comes to the health and physical welfare of the prisoners in my custody, I demand in the name of common humanity that they be given such medical attention as they require.

"I am trying to give the people of this county the best administration this office has ever had, and I rebel at the small and mean annoyances which they have seen fit to visit upon me in my efforts to do a conscientious and honest duty."
