S. A. C. BOXERS ARE MAKING GREAT CLEANUP IN AMATEUR CHAMP BOUTS AT FRISCO

There is great rejoicing today at the Seattle Athletic club and among the friends of the Blue Diamond boxers now in San Francisco, under the wing of Chet McIntyre, over the outcome of the first six bouts for the All-Western amateur boxing championships, pulled off last night. S. A. C. boxers cleaned up in four of the six events, one of the victories being by the K. O. route.

In the 125-pound class Henry Gleason, S. A. C., won the decision over W. Gonzales, Visitation Valley Athletic association, in three rounds. In the 155-pound class, Tommy Phelps of the S. A. C. defeated Dick O'Meara of the Olympic club, San Francisco, getting the verdict in three rounds. In the same class Earl Baird of the S. A. C. won a three-round decision over E. Mattie of the Anahem high school. A. Gardiner of the Deseret gymnasium, of Salt Lake City, defeated W. Knowlton of the Multnomah club, Portland, winning a three-round decision in the 145-pound class.

"WEE" COYLE TO COACH ELEVEN

("Wee") Coyle, one of the greatest football heroes ever turned out by the U. of W., who played with the team during his four college years, and who captained it during his last year in school, has accepted the offer of Gonzaga college, at Spokane, to coach the eleven of that institution this year. 
THREE IN TIE FOR 1ST PLACE

Seattle fans, who have been yearning for a chance to see some professional boxing for some time past, will be satisfied tonight. The Greenwood Athletic club, managed by Charley Ajax, has set tonight as the opening date for a series of smokery. And for a main event, Ajax has signed the two old Seattle rivals, Chet Neff and Ed Pinkman.

The Greenwood Athletic club, situated at 8th and Greenwood, is a roomy structure, which will accommodate a good crowd. Ajax, manager of the club, has staged a number of shows there in the last three years, and he has always put on a good card. Neff recognizes the fact that Pinkman is no flyover as a boxer, and has been in hard training at Austin & Salt's with this event. He holds a close decision over Pinkman and that naturally adds to his confidence as to the outcome of tonight's bout, but that same decision is acting as a spur to Pinkman to win back his lost laurels, and he is figuring on stopping the doughty Frenchman with one Roman punch. SWIM NEW RECORDS

CHICAGO, April 16.—Two world's amateur swimming records were lowered here last night at the National Amateur Athletic union swimming tournament. A. C. Rathel of the Illinois A. C. swam the 100 yards in 54.2-5 seconds, trimming Duke Kahano-mohi's mark one-fifth second. J. H. Fisher and Perry McMillan won the 400-yard relay championship in 3 minutes and 45.3-5 seconds, cutting two-fifths of a second from the former record.

FATHER CAN GIVE NO EXPLANATION OF SON'S SUICIDE

Judge Darius Baker, of the Rhode Island supreme court, answering messages from Seattle regarding the suicide of his son, George J. Baker, at the Seattle Athletic club Thursday, offers no explanation as to the probable cause of his son's act. Young Baker ended his life with a .32-caliber revolver in his room at the club Thursday. Baker was employed as a draftsman in the Seattle office of the United States forestry service. He was transferred to the local bureau from Olympia April 1, and had lived at the club since April 3. Two notes, one to his father and the other to H. Lansing Plumb of Olympia were found on Baker's dresser. Their contents have not been disclosed. It is thought likely they will show that Baker killed himself because he was afflicted with tuberculosis.




THE CATCHER IS THE MAIN POINT OF DEFENSIVE PLAY.

ONLY USE ONE HAND WHEN TAKING OFF YOUR MASK.


