WHAT'S BEST FOR BOYS AND GIRLS WOMEN EXPERTS TELL IN MEETING

Leading women in children's uplift movements in America were heard Tuesday at the First Presbyterian church by hundreds of Seattle parents. The speakers included Mrs. Frederick Schoff, Mrs. Milton F. Higgins, Miss Bessie Locke and Mrs. Orville T. Wright, on their way to the national conference, Mothers' Congress and Parent-Teachers' associations, of which some are officers and others closely affiliated, at Portland.

They left the city Tuesday night. Some of the things they said: "The home has nine times more teaching to do than the school. There are 13,000,000 whose entire care is in the hands of fathers and mothers. Children are the most valuable assets we have. Suppose we get this knowledge to fathers and mothers? We build up a new class of humanity."

"The question of thrift and industry in a large one, in manual training schools the standard of manufactured products should be kept as high as if the boys and girls were turning out articles for the market. Where this has been tried, most of the schools' graduates have positions awaiting them when they finish school."

"Parents should enter into the social life of their children in the high schools. High school students are too young to enter into social life as they do, uncapacitated."

"The kindergarten system is the most certain, quickest and very best means of promoting the welfare of the people of any community. I advocate the passing of a law by the next legislature providing for kindergartens."

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

Q.—Can you please give me directions for making a dustless floor mop? Thanking you for your kindness, I am INDUSTRIOUS HOUSEWIFE. A.—There is a very simple way in which you can mix two quarts of kerosene with one pint of boiled linseed oil. Dip the soft, long strands of a cotton mop in the mixture, keeping it there until thoroughly saturated. Then hang it until it drips well and it is ready for daily use on your floors. Soak the mop once every two weeks.
