BABY PARADE TO BE A FEATURE OF SHRINE WEEK

Atlantic City's baby carriage parade, which each year is a feature on the board walk of the famous resort, as well as in Asbury Park, N. Y., will be duplicated in Seattle this summer during the visit of the Imperial council, Nobles of the Myrtle Shrine.

The committee in charge of the parade, with headquarters in the Alaska building, room 719, has imposed three requirements on all entries: Children must be between the ages of 6 months and 3 years; each vehicle must represent some certain thing, or must be decorated, and the child in the carriage must be dressed to carry out the idea of the float.

Cash prizes and other awards will be made the best-decorated winners.

Each child must be entered by name and age on blanks which the committee has prepared for distribution to those wishing to compete.
