

Schools Closed in Berlin; City Celebrates Victory Over Slavs

GERMANS SWEEP ON IN GALICIA

BERLIN, June 4.—Along a front of 100 miles, the great Austro-German army of Galicia is rolling forward against Lemberg.

With Przemysl again garrisoned by the Austrian forces, the combined armies of Gen. Von Mackenzen and Gen. Von Lingens are pressing their pursuit of the retreating Russians, while the Slavs are making desperate efforts to reform their shattered lines for a final stand.

Details are still lacking of the number of prisoners and quantity of munitions and supplies taken by the victors in the capture of Przemysl.

Unofficial reports declare, however, that many guns were abandoned.

Highest praise was given the Bavarian troops by Gen. Von Mackenzen today in a telegram to the king of Bavaria, telling of the great Teutonic victory in the East.

It was the Bavarians who led the final assault. They carried three of the fortifications on Monday and two more the following day.

"The conduct of our brave Bavarian troops aided us in our great victory," he wired. "They have won a name for themselves."

Nearly three Austrian and German army corps have now poured thru Przemysl along the Lemberg railway and occupied Medyka, eight miles east of Przemysl, without resistance.

From the south, Gen. Von Lingens is hurling a huge army against the Russian left wing.

In this movement a great battle is raging from the Sarnar to the north of Stry.

Close Schools to Celebrate

Repeated Russian counter attacks are declared to have failed and the wing of the Slav force is steadily being bent back.

Retreating from the Petroleum district, the Russians are firing every oil well in their path. Reports from Vienna estimated that \$0,000 oil fires were burning.

All schools were closed here today so that the children might join in the general celebration of the victory.

Newspapers predicted Gen. Von Mackenzen will drive every Russian soldier out of Galicia.

MARKET SHOWS EFFECT OF U. S. STEEL RULING

NEW YORK, June 4.—United States Steel common opened from 2 to 5 points higher on the stock exchange today, following the decision yesterday of the federal court denying the government suit to dissolve the corporation.

The United States district court for New Jersey was unanimous in its decision denying the government's motion.

The court found there was no violation of the anti-trust law in acquiring the Tennessee Coal & Iron Co.

Size, the court held, is not the criterion of whether unlawful combination in restraint of trade had been effected.

The government probably will appeal to the supreme court.

Heavy trading in the steel issues marked the opening of trading at the New York Stock Exchange.

A block of 25,000 shares sold from 64 to 62. This was an advance of 2% on the later trading.

Steel preferred was up 2%. Other stocks also advanced vigorously. Bethlehem Steel opened 2 1/2 higher. Reading was up 2 points. Union Pacific 1 1/2 and Southern Pacific 1%.

OLYMPIC JUDGE ASKS MERCY IN LEO FRANK CASE

OLYMPIA, June 4.—A plea for clemency was made by Chief Justice George E. Morris of the Washington supreme court in behalf of Leo Frank in a letter to Gov. Slaton of Georgia.

Judge Morris urges the point that the presiding judge expressed doubt of Frank's guilt of the murder of Mary Phagan.

Secondly, he says there was undoubted animosity against Frank by the audience in the court room, so noticeable that the verdict had to be received during Frank's absence.

"This was a 'precaution without precedent,'" Judge Morris said.

STATE GRANGE DISCUSSES CITY MILK ORDINANCE

CENTRALIA, June 4.—The Seattle milk ordinance produced the most spirited discussion of the state grange meeting here, and a resolution was finally adopted, as proposed by Fred Nelson, a King county dairyman, condemning one section in the bill.

This section does not permit an appeal to be taken from the decision of an official of the health department.

C. R. Keeley was re-elected president of the grange by unanimous vote. The Lawson conviction in Colorado was condemned.

Will H. Hanna, who introduced the milk ordinance in the council, today declared that the section criticized by the state grange would be eliminated from the bill.

"There was no intention that appeals shall be curtailed," said Hanna.

PETROGRAD SAYS IT ISN'T BAD REVERSE

PETROGRAD, June 4.—Three Austrian prisoners were slaughtered and 4,000 taken in a combat 50 miles northwest of Przemysl, it was officially announced today.

The fall of Przemysl is admitted by the war office, but the statement reporting the heavy losses inflicted upon the enemy north of the fortress partly offset the effect of the defeat. It was also declared the capture of Przemysl must not be construed as a severe reverse.

Explaining the evacuation of the forts, the war office said the garrison retired eastward upon previously prepared positions.

By withdrawing, the Russians shortened their line, rendering further advance of the enemy forces upon Lemberg extremely improbable.

AUSTRIANS TRYING TO DISLODGE ENEMY

ROME, June 4.—Pounding the Italian positions with artillery and delivering strong infantry attacks, the Austrians are desperately endeavoring to dislodge King Victor Emmanuel's forces from the Monte Croce pass.

IN POOR HEALTH, KILLS HIMSELF

Returning to her home at 144 W. 84th st., early Friday evening, to prepare dinner, Mrs. Wm. Donohue found the body of her husband, alongside of which lay a 22 caliber rifle. Donohue had shot himself thru the breast and head. A note addressed to Mrs. Donohue, was found lying on a table. It read: "If God will forgive me for this, I hope you will. Your loving husband, Will."



ON TO CONSTANTINOPLE—ADVANCE OF ALLIES IN DARDANELLES



How the allied French and British troops have clinched their hold on Turkish soil and are pushing forward to Constantinople. The advance is indicated by the arrows. All parties experienced severe battles in their march inland, but were assisted by the allied fleets, which shelled the Turkish trenches and ramparts and made them uninhabitable. According to the British official reports, the Turks are fighting gallantly under the direction of German officers, but are being gradually forced back. The cities marked with black circles from the entrance to the Dar-

danelles up as far as the narrows at Nagara, are those of which the forts have been shelled by the fleet. Gallipoli, far up the straits, has been shelled overland from the Gulf of Saros, at distances varying from 10 to 15 miles.
