YACHTS WILL START ON LONG PACIFIC RACE

SAN FRANCISCO, June 11.—A fleet of the fastest American yachts on the Pacific is due to sail out of San Francisco harbor tomorrow and race to Honolulu. A return race will be run from Honolulu to San Francisco, starting one week after the last vessel reaches Hawaii.

For several days the waters outside the Golden Gate have been alive with craft of all sizes and rigs, making trial spins in preparation for the big event. The larger yachts are to be handicapped according to the universal rules, so that the little fellows may have an even chance.

The first boat into Honolulu harbor will receive a trophy valued at \$500, and the second a cup worth \$250. There are \$2,000 worth of prizes.

One of the fastest entrants is the Hawaii, flying the pennant of the Royal Hawaiian Yacht club. C. E. Miller's sloop Athens, one of the first to pass thru the Panama canal, also is entered. Other yachts are entered representing the San Francisco Yacht club, the South Coast Yacht club, and yachting associations on Puget sound.

WOLVERTON HURT IN AUTO ACCIDENT

SAN FRANCISCO, June 11.—Seriously injured and with a possible puncture of the lungs, Harry S. Wolverton, manager of the San Francisco baseball club, is confined to a hospital today, where he was taken, following an automobile accident in which he received three broken ribs and a number of deep gashes.

Wolverton attempted to crank his automobile when it started down a steep incline, catching his clothing and dragging him until it crashed into a telephone pole a block away.

Stratton, Ray Paulsen, Jack Haswell, James Crawford and E. R. Smith.

Almost every driver who will face Starter Pullen Saturday has had experience on half-mile tracks, and it takes some nerve to go at one of the turns wide open. No cut-off for these drivers. Every man takes his own life in his hands while driving on a half-mile track. Yet these drivers like it.

The meet which opens Saturday is, in the opinion of drivers and their mechanics, the most promising one of the year, from a racing standpoint, and Manager Robert A. Hiller has brought together the best drivers and the fastest machines that have been assembled at either of the Portland, Salem, Spokane, North Yakima or Walla Walla meets.

The Seattle drivers are anxious to see the coming two days' meet a great success, and spectators at the track will see some racing that will be full of thrills and sensations.

It is intercity racing, with entries from Seattle, Tacoma, North Yakima and Spokane, and is the first intercity auto meet ever held here.

Several of the cars are rated as being among the world's fastest dirt track racing machines. Jean Romano and his friends believe that the Romano will set a new world's record for a half-mile track Sunday. The rain has improved the track, and, with clear weather, it will be very fast.

Unger's Balloon Is First

SAN FRANCISCO, June 11.—Edward Unger's balloon "California" today was officially declared winner of the Panama-Pacific exposition balloon race. In the face of adverse conditions, the big bag, which ascended at the fair grounds yesterday noon traveled 110 miles and landed last night near San Joaquin.

Simultaneously came word that the balloon "Jewel City," George B. Harrison pilot, had descended near Stockton, having reached a point 75 miles from San Francisco. Harrison and his aids were dragged half a mile in the basket over a plowed field before they could get out. Neither was hurt. Valve trouble forced them to land.


