### SCOURING DOMINION FOR MEN

LAGGAN, Alberta, Canada, June 23.—Step over the line into Canada and the war becomes a much nearer thing. It obtrudes itself upon the sight and into the every-day peaceful affairs of work and pleasure.

You are waiting to take your train, there are officers in "the king's khaki" on the platform and you learn that a company is about to entrain for camp, and, later, in August, they are to go around seas to help fill the gaps around Ypres.

You talk to the officer and find that he is the last of four brothers to follow the colors and the other three are already dead. Did he feel it necessary to add himself to the three? His widowed mother had her doubts—this he did admit—but to him it seemed the only thing to do. They had started and there was but one thing to do—to go thru.

**Ladies' Orchestra Knits Socks**  
At the hotel where you stop there is a ladies' orchestra and between dance numbers the musicians knit—so do the young girl dancers and the chaperons—always the heavy gray woolen socks worn by the soldiers.

From your train you observe that at every tunnel and bridge there is a khaki uniformed sentry with his bayonet-tipped rifle. At every small station and in the country hotels are typewritten news bulletins with the latest about the war, in which the Germans are uniformly spoken of as "Huns," while the king's troops are as uniformly heroes.

And at every big town there is a standing invitation to workmen and citizens to become heroes by donning the king's khaki and helping to make up the additional 35,000 Canadiana called for by the provincial government.

**Soldiers Banqueted**  
The other night at Calgary a beautiful banquet was given by the Chamber of Commerce to members of the local Typographical union, who had announced their intention to enlist.

Enlistments in the industrial army are also sought. England has sent out a call to the provinces for artisans, men to work in the ship yards and the ammunition plants—and the war is long way off—but the casualties strike very close home. The Canadian losses already total 15,000. Almost every day the papers here carry long lists of the killed, wounded and missing. Among the injured, about every sixth man is described as suffering from poisonous gases.

**A PONY EXPRESS RACE TO BE SEEN**  
When the West was young, the superlative in rapid transit was the pony express.  
Express messengers then carried the mail over long miles of trail, at break-neck speed, horses and riders changing every few miles.  
It was a dangerous business, and the pony express messenger was looked upon as one of the most romantic daredevil figures of those early days.  
A pony express race will be one of the features of the Western Stampede and Roundup at Madison park, July 10 to 16, during Shrine week.  
In this event, mounts must be changed frequently while the horse is in motion, and riders will be required to take the saddle without touching the stirrup, swinging from the ground to the back of the horse at full gallop.  
There will be many other events and contests, all governed by the fixed rules of roundup exhibitions, which demand the spectacular and which are framed to show the cowboys and cowgirls at their best.
