LESS RAIN HERE THAN IN EAST!

California's wondrous climate has nothing on little old Seattle, according to Prof. Edwin J. Saunders, of the University of Washington.

Speaking in Science hall Tuesday night, he pointed out in a paper on "The Climatic Conditions of Washington" that no place in the world has so varied a climate as the east-coast western parts of this state.

"In the last 19 years," he said, "Western Washington has seen only 16 days when the mercury was higher than 90 degrees and but three days when it dropped below 50. On the east side 119 degrees more and 10 to 25 degrees below are frequent occurrences.

"Seattle has an average of 156 dry days a year. Buffalo, New York, and other Eastern cities have over 170. Our summers are ideal and very little rain."

HOWA PEOPLE SEE THE LIBERTY BELL

DES MOINES, Ia., July 7.—The special train bearing the Liberty Bell to San Francisco made five stops during its progress across Iowa today. The first was at Des Moines at noon, when the lieutenant governor and most of the state officials boarded the train and accompanied it to Des Moines. Other stops were made here, at Mason, Grinnell and Iowa City. The train is due at Topeka, Kan., at 9 p. m.

TELLS 'EM OF PROHIBITION

ATLANTIC CITY, July 8.—Legal-ized liquor traffic is killing 24,000 Americans every day, according to Rev. A. W. Leonard, pastor of the First Methodist Episcopal church of Seattle, in an address before the Anti-Saloon league here today.

Rev. Leonard declared 3,500,000 people are dying every year as the result of the use of alcohol.

"Man has never known of a plague or an epidemic that wrought greater disaster than liquor," said Dr. Leonard. "It is man's greatest foe."

Rev. Leonard told of the successful campaign against liquor in the Pacific Northwest.

He said the campaign was one of education, aggressiveness and persistently fought. The sage temperance legislation which Washington enjoys today, he said, is the result of years of teaching.

Lester E. Kirkpatrick of Seattle was elected by the biennial convention of the Anti-Saloon league of America as a member of the executive committee of the national organization.

He is to represent the Sixteenth district, comprising the states of Washington, Oregon, Idaho, Montana, Wyoming, North and South Dakota. It is this powerful committee that controls the policies and operations of the national movement in all the states, including the program before congress.

BUTLER LICENSE BILL HELD UP

The milk ordinance is settled, but Seattle's councilmen promise to continue furnishing her with good comedy in connection with cafe dancing.

Councilman Dale's new bill, authorizing dancing in hotels and cafes where liquor is dispensed, providing that dancing be licensed, was killed at the Tuesday afternoon meeting, following the recommendation Tuesday forenoon by the license committee that it be indefinitely postponed. The vote in council was 5 to 4.

Haas, Lundy, Fitzgerald, Erickson and Hesketh opposed it. Dale, Bolton, Marble and Hanna were for it.

Hanna made a vain plea for speedy settlement of Lundy's ordinance to revoke the liquor license of the Butler hotel cafe.

"Business men are getting tired of our dilly-dallying," he declared. "It is time everybody was laying his cards on the table."

Various councilmen who opposed a motion by Hanna to call the ordinance from committee, where it is now hiding like a startled deer, said they wanted to give Councilman Hesketh more time to study it.

But Hesketh seemed to have the dance question firmly fixed in his mind.

"I am liberal in my views, and I am not a prohibitionist, but I don't approve of cafe dancing," he declared.

The bill will be shooed out of committee next Monday.

POLICE OVERLOOK SOME HOLDUP MEN

Altho the police are believed to have rounded up the boldest of the crooks who have been coming to Seattle for several weeks, to be here when the shrimers arrive, a variety of holdups reported in the thickly settled parts of the city leads to the conclusion that a great number of petty crooks have been overlooked.

Tom Burke, 2219 1/2 Los Angeles st., Georgetown, was strong-armed by two thugs at Western av. and Pike st. at 11:30 p. m. Tuesday, and robbed of \$3.90 and a gold watch.

C. W. Matthews, 328 15th av. N., was held up at 9:45 p. m. at Eighth and Spring by two men, one masked and both armed, who robbed him of \$10.50.

RUSSIAN CONSUL'S WIFE ARRIVES HERE

Mrs. Nicholas Bogoiavlensky, wife of the Russian consul general at Seattle, has arrived here, accompanied by her three children to enjoy their home in the city. Her husband came here as consul a year ago and her arrival marks the opening of their permanent home in the West.

Her two sons will enter Broadway high school in the fall, while the daughter plans to enter Washington when she has mastered enough English to carry on her studies.

AUTOISTS WHO RUN AWAY TO BE JAILED

The council Tuesday passed an ordinance providing for jail sentences and fines for drivers who fail to stop and offer first aid, sympathy and best wishes to persons they run over. Mayor Gill Wednesday approved it. By its terms it becomes a law immediately.

WHY NEARING LOST HIS JOB



Fired for "free speech." Dr. Scott Nearing, noted sociologist, who was ousted without hearing from University of Pennsylvania. Staff Special.

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., July 7.—Dr. Scott Nearing, the best loved and the best of teachers of the University of Pennsylvania, who has been fired because he stood for "free speech," although only a young man, is famous as a sociologist and fighter of child labor evils.

Dr. Nearing was assistant professor of economics and his summary dismissal because his views and utterances on economic subjects were considered too radical by the trustees has aroused a storm of protest.

For years Dr. Nearing has lectured and written against child labor exploitation. Strong in his convictions, he has gone into churches in the mill districts of his state and lectured against the evils of child labor.

In 1908, the year he was appointed to the faculty of Swarthmore college, he published his first book on economics and since then has published several more books on social adjustment, child labor and the wages problem.

As teacher he won the respect and admiration of all students. Dean McRea of the Wharton school says of him:

"Scott Nearing is an efficient teacher, an influence for good in personal relationships with the students and colleagues and an able and helpful administrator."

CONDEMNATION SUIT DISMISSED

Litigation between the city and the Seattle, Renton & Southern Railway, which began in 1911, was ended Wednesday when the council at a special meeting unanimously passed an ordinance repealing an old ordinance providing for taking over the road by condemnation.

This is in line with the course outlined a week ago, when it was decided to clear the decks of litigation, so the city might proceed with the improvement of Rainier av.

The city's condemnation suit had reached the supreme court.

The trial of the railway against the city, to enjoin the city from forcing the company to raise its tracks along Rainier av., is scheduled to begin Thursday in the federal court, before Federal Judge Jeremiah Neter.

ASKS \$50,000 OF N. P. TO ATONE FOR HUMILIATION

Fifty thousand dollars for the humiliation he suffers as a result of being forced to wear wire fastenings in his mouth to support his lower lip, teeth and gums, are asked by William Mahoney, of 1718 12th av. S., as damages against the Northern Pacific.

Mahoney filed a suit in superior court Wednesday, alleging he was injured thru carelessness of employees of the railroad at the crossing at Eighth av. S., on May 11, when the auto he was seated in was struck by a train.
