Young Morgan is 23. He was soberly dressed and unobtrusive in manner. The entire baggage of the young couple consisted of two dress suit cases.

INDIANS PEACE-LOVING, HE SAYS

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 10.—"Wild West shows and motion pictures depicting Indian massacres are evil."
"Buffalo Bill and like characters who make a living by exploiting the Indian race are largely responsible for the fear with which all Indians are regarded by children."
These statements were made today by Rev. Sherman Coolidge, president of the Society of American Indians, who is here attending a congress on Indian progress.
"Indian fights should be forgotten by the whites and not perpetuated in picture lies," said Coolidge. "Such pictures of the pioneer days grossly misrepresent the Indian race. Indians are naturally a peace-loving people instead of the cruel savages usually shown in films. The red man never killed for the joy of killing. The pioneers they regarded as invaders and the Indian fought to protect his home and family."

J. PIERP. COLLECTS A LITTLE BILL

NEW YORK, Aug. 10.—Unheralded and accompanied by a squad of silent men, whose hip pockets bulged suspiciously, a long steel car slid into the Grand Central railroad station today, unnoticed by the thousands of hurrying commuters and thru passengers.
In the car was packed \$100,000,000 in gold, the first direct shipment from England since the war, in payment for shiploads of munitions which have been supplied to Great Britain.
The gold was quietly put aboard motor trucks and taken to the United States subtreasury and placed to the credit of J. P. Morgan & Co.

SLASHES CLOTHES IN GIRLS' ROOM

PORTLAND, Aug. 10.—With sentence continued in the municipal court, following an admission that he entered the apartments of Misses Mollie and Jennie Smith during their absence, and in gratifying a peculiar mania, slashed their clothing to pieces, M. H. Black, 25, of Baltimore, reputed heir to millions, today faces a federal charge of attempting to use the United States mails to defraud.
The federal charge grew out of a letter, apparently signed by Miss Mollie Smith, that Black is alleged to have written a Mrs. Baird of Kansas City, asking for \$25.
Black is said to have been suffering from a mania for destroying feminine apparel for some time, and was on a tour of the world with his mother in hopes of riding himself of the obsession, when arrested here.

GOETHALS DOESN'T WANT 'FUSS'

NEW YORK, Aug. 10.—Provided he is not lionized, Maj. Gen. George W. Goethals, governor of the Panama canal zone, will leave here August 20, en route to the Panama-Pacific exposition. Gen. Goethals said today he wanted no "fuss" made over him.

GEORGE FITCH, HUMORIST, DIES

BERKELEY, Cal., Aug. 10.—George Fitch, the American humorist, is dead here today as a result of complications, following an operation for appendicitis.
Fitch came to California with his wife and three children to attend the convention of the American press humorists. He was taken ill Friday at the home of his sister, Miss R. Louise Fitch, of Berkeley.
Fitch is best known for his "Siwash College" stories and "Homeburg Memories." He was 38 years old. His home is in Galva, Ill.
Funeral services will be held here Friday. Interment will be made at Galva, Ill., where Fitch's father resides.

WILL MARRY MODEL PRISONER

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 10.—A remarkable love pact today binds together Otis McGinnis, former Los Angeles reaily man, now serving two years in San Quentin, and Olive L. Davis, pretty stenographer, who has promised to marry him when his term expires.
According to its terms McGinnis promises to be a model prisoner and Miss Davis promises to be faithful to him all the time he is locked up, and to marry him when he is released.

TRIED TO BEAT WORLD RECORD

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 10.—Ted Meredith, world's record holder for the half mile run, today failed in his attempt to lower Maxey Lang's record of 47 seconds in a quarter mile straight-away run. His time was 48.3.5. The race was run on the exposition track. Horner, of Cincinnati, was his only competitor.

COAST MANAGER OF "BIG 4" HERE

A. W. Goff, Pacific Coast division manager of Vitagraph-Lubin-Selig-Essanay, Inc., is a visitor at the local branch for a few days.
Seattle in particular seems to set a mark in film business that would be a credit to any Eastern city, said Goff, and in view of this fact he is considering Seattle as a possible division headquarters for the "Big Four" coast features.

CENSORS SEE ORIENTAL BEAUTIES

The board of theatre censors has begun an inquiry in the matter of the "Oriental Beauty" show at 161 Washington st., which was brought to the attention of Chief Lang by The Star, and which the chief has calmly ignored.
One member of the board already has seen the show. A report is to be made at the regular meeting of the censors Wednesday, when, it is believed, some plan of action for stopping the performance will be agreed upon.
At least one of Chief Lang's policemen has visited the interior of the show more than once, and has allowed the girl dancer to continue "luring the naughty flea" without molestation.

MAPLE HILLS, Kan., Aug. 10.—Standing off more than 100 citizens, bandits blew open the vault of the State bank here today and scaped with \$3,000. The early morning fog aided the robbers. A posse started in pursuit.

KLEIN TELLS WHY HE QUIT JOB ON LINER

H. C. Klein, who resigned as chief officer of the Minnesota just before the big liner started on her last trip to Vladivostok, Siberia, declared to The Star Tuesday that he left because, being of German birth, he had been subjected to more or less embarrassment while the vessel was in allied ports on the other side of the Pacific.
The Star told Saturday how certain unnamed German officers quit the ship this trip because of a warning they had received from a German source that it would not be safe to make the voyage. Klein asserts he heard nothing of any such warning, and that it had nothing to do with his leaving.


