

CHICAGO, Aug. 21.—Visions of another pennant floating over the South Side ball yard came to White Sox rosters today when President Comiskey confirmed dispatches from Cleveland that his club had purchased Joe Jackson, slugging outfielder, from Cleveland.

Jackson for years has been one of the heaviest hitters in the big leagues. When he first reached the big brush from the minors he was with the Philadelphia Athletics. Crafty Connie Mack failed to note his slugging ability, however, because of a tendency to "pull away" from the plate while batting. He was sent back to the minors and soon thereafter purchased by Cleveland. Immediately he became one of the best batters in the country. He always could field an run bases like a champion. For many years it has been a close race between Ty Cobb, Tris Speaker and Jackson for the batting leadership of the American league. His acquisition will lend great strength to the White Sox and the rosters are confident that it will enable the club to grab the bunting.
