


## BIELOSTOK, ON RAILROAD, NOW FACES CAPTURE

BERLIN, Aug. 26.—Capture of Bielostok, on the railway to Petrograd, is believed to be a matter of hours.

Having hacked his way toward the railway thru the Russian rear guard, Gen. Von Gallwitz was within eight miles of Bielostok early today.

The Slavs were still offering stubborn resistance to the German advance when the last official dispatches were filed.

They were slowly withdrawing directly to the east, instead of falling back upon the city, however.

This was believed to indicate preparations have been made for the evacuation of Bielostok and that once the outer defenses of the city are reached, it will be taken with comparatively little fighting.

## T.R. ATTACKS U. S. POLICY IN RAIN BOMBS SPEECH; NOW WOOD'S IN BAD ON WAR SHOPS IN BAVARIA

WASHINGTON, Aug. 26.—Gen. Leonard Wood will probably be asked by the war department to explain why he invited Col. Roosevelt to the military instruction camp at Plattsburg, N. Y., where the colonel made a speech which is considered as condemning President Wilson's foreign policy. Secy Garrison said he was not yet prepared to discuss the incident.

### DENOUNCES U. S. POLICY

PLATTSBURG, N. Y., Aug. 26.—For 13 months America has played an ignoble part among the nations, was one of the statements snapped out by Col. Roosevelt which tingled thru the business men's military instruction camp here today.

The former president addressed the citizen soldiers last night, maintaining that, under The Hague convention, the U. S. was bound to "take whatever action was necessary to prevent, and, if not, to prevent them, to undo the hideous wrong that was done Belgium."

The colonel denounced the pacifist as "no better citizen than a poltroon."

He declared the U. S. had "tamely submitted to seeing the weak, whom we had covenanted to protect, wronged."

"We have seen our own men, women and children murdered on the seas without action on our part," he said.

Roosevelt denounced Germany for its "disregard of international morality," and declared that, as for exportation of munitions, "it would be a base abandonment of morality to refuse to make these shipments."


### Denounces Government

The government was denounced for failing to take any steps toward preparedness, and the colonel declared the munitions manufacturers should be encouraged "so that we may be able to hold our own when the hour of peril comes to us in our turn, as assuredly it will come if we are bound to remain neutral."

He spoke on behalf of the weak who are wronged, and too stolid and lazy to prepare to defend ourselves against wrong."

## PARIS, Aug. 26.—Sbty-two

French aviators bombed the German munitions factories at Dilling, Bavaria, in the greatest aerial raid of the war, the war office announced today.

The great flotilla of aeroplanes dropped 150 bombs upon the munitions factories, the communique stated.

Of this number 35 were of large caliber and are believed to have done great damage.

The aviators flew more than 100 miles and return from their base in the Vosges.

Never before have such a great number of aviators participated in a raid.

The official statement also confirmed the Berlin report of Offenburg having been attacked by a French aviator. No mention was made, however, of the result of this raid.

About Souchez, Neuville and Roye, bomb fighting is still in progress, the statement added, but no important infantry attacks have been made. In the Argonne operations are confined to bomb attacks.

## BELIEVE BALKANS WILL JOIN ALLIES

LONDON, Aug. 26.—Serbia has taken an important step toward securing the aid of other Balkan powers in an attack on Constantinople. It was widely reported in diplomatic circles today.

The Serbian note, replying to the proposal of the allies for concessions to Bulgaria, has reached the Italian foreign office, and, while it does not contain an unqualified agreement to cede Serbian Macedonia to Bulgaria, it placates Italy.

This paves the way for a second step in the Balkan negotiations thru which the allies hope to secure the aid of Bulgaria.
