WHITE SOX BEGAN TO TRAIN MUCH TOO SOON

Chicago critics say the reason for the White Sox slump, which began July 1 and cost them the lead and several games besides, was merely a breakdown after months of solid baseball. The Chicagoans started to train a month earlier than any other club. They were stale. As the Comiskeyers are strict in their habits, no other reason for their slump is apparent. They were so well trained they got away to a good lead, but the Red Sox and Tigers, starting three weeks later, while not as near ready opening day, gradually acquired speed and pitch as the race tightened.

The Pittsburgh Pirates, while not pennant winners since 1909, have always been near the top and finished the best club in the league. They are another argument in favor of a lighter training trip. Clarke admits he will start about ten days or two weeks earlier than heretofore, so his men will be ready by the start of the season instead of allowing them two weeks to get in condition.

Muggsy McGraw Must Upset Tradition to Rebuild Real Winners Inside of 5 Years

John McGraw of the Giants has started the tearing down of a championship ball club and the rebuilding of another, and it will be interesting to note how long it will take to turn the trick. History shows that when a championship team is torn apart it takes five or six years to build another. McGraw won the pennant in 1905, tore the machine apart and was not able to reach the top again until 1911. It took six years to replace Bowerman, Breenahan, McGann and the others and weave the newcomers into the McGraw style of play. Connie Mack of the Athletics won in 1905 and began to tear down and rebuild. It took him five years to win another pennant after he had replaced Davis, Murphy, Monte and Lave Cross with McInnis, Collins, Barry and Baker and made changes in the other departments. Fred Clarke led Pittsburgh to a flag in 1909; spent five years rebuilding, and now he has a good chance. Hughey Jennings won at Detroit in 1909. In five years he has shed all the members of the pennant team except Cobb, Crawford, Stange and Bush. He has rebuilt a team that has
