CONVICTED, SENTENCED TO PENITENTIARY; HIS SWEETHEART AGREES TO WAIT FOR HIM

A Novel Love Agreement Drawn Up by Girl Who Says She Knows Man Is Innocent and That She Will Wait and Marry Him When He Serves Out His Sentence of Two Years.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Aug. 28.—The girl in the case is Miss Olive L. Davis, a stenographer of ability in a prominent attorney's office.

The man is Otis McGinnis, who is now serving two years in San Quentin after being accused and convicted of wrongdoing in connection with a real estate deal.

Miss Davis and McGinnis were plighted to wed not long before the trouble occurred.

When the case came up, she did everything in her power to save him, declaring she knew him to be innocent. When, in spite of her efforts, he was convicted, she declared him to be falsely convicted, saying she would stand by him to the end.

To show her complete loyalty, this girl drew up an agreement, signed it and handed it to her fiance to sign, also.

By it she agreed to remain true and loyal to him during his two years' incarceration, and to wed

him as soon as practicable at the end of his sentence.

On his part he agreed to live an exemplary life in the prison and to marry her as soon as practicable after his sentence terminated.

The novel pact reads in full as follows:

This agreement made and entered into this 18th day of January, 1918, at Los Angeles, Cal., by and between Olive L. Davis and Otis McGinnis.

In consideration of our love for each other, we hereby make the following promises and covenants, one to the other: I, Olive L. Davis, knowing that you, Otis McGinnis, are entirely innocent of the charge which has been made against

you, and on account of which you are about to serve a sentence of two years in the state institution at San Quentin, do hereby faithfully and sincerely promise to become your true and loving wife as soon after your release from the said institution as is deemed practicable by yourself and me.

I further promise that during the term of my sentence I will be obedient in every respect to the requirements of the said institution, and will go about all duties required of me in a cheerful, Christianlike manner.

I also promise that during the term of my sentence I will be obedient in every respect to the requirements of the said institution, and will go about all duties required of me in a cheerful, Christianlike manner.

That during your absence from me I will conduct myself in such a manner as the wife should in the absence of her husband.

Otis McGinnis, hereby promises Olive L. Davis that, upon my release from the said institution, or as soon thereafter as it is possible for me to do so, I will take you, Olive L. Davis, as my wife, and that from thenceforth I will love, cherish and protect you.

I further promise that I will not refuse to become your wife unless, subsequent to the date of this agreement, you are guilty of some act which is wrong for any man to commit against his own wife; and

That during your absence from me I will conduct myself in such a manner as the wife should in the absence of her husband.

Otis McGinnis, hereby promises Olive L. Davis that, upon my release from the said institution, or as soon thereafter as it is possible for me to do so, I will take you, Olive L. Davis, as my wife, and that from thenceforth I will love, cherish and protect you.

INSTRUCTION CAMP BUSY

STAFF SPECIAL. BUSINESS MEN'S INSTRUCTION CAMP, AMERICAN LAKE, Aug. 30.—Half of the men in training here spent the week-end at home, returning last night. This morning they resumed camp life with renewed zest and enthusiasm.

The war students have by now mastered the school of the squad and have had instruction in rifle and bayonet drill. By the end of the week they will be ready for target practice.

They have yet to take up outpost duty, advance and rear guard, and attack and defense. On Thursday there will be maneuvers under near-war conditions, at which time these phases of warfare will be demonstrated.

Col. Wilson, commanding the camp, 60 years old, and within two years of retirement, announces that he will this week ride 90 miles in three days on horseback in compliance with the army regulations for officers to show his physical fitness.

The camp is a week old, and the war students have two more weeks to serve. Their progress has surprised the instructors. Plans are already under way for next year's encampment, at which it is hoped to have an advanced course for the "veterans" of this year and a beginners' course for rookies.

WANT COALITION IN RUSSIA, TOO

PETROGRAD, Aug. 30.—Formation of a coalition cabinet to control the government during the remainder of the war was urged at a great mass meeting in Moscow. Members of the duma and leaders of all factions organized the meeting, dispatches here today declared. A resolution was adopted urging continuance of the war regardless of cost.

CARRANZA SAID TO BE IN CAPITAL

WASHINGTON, Aug. 30.—Gen. Carranza is believed to be in Mexico City. With the transfer of the first chief's headquarters from Vera Cruz to the capital, the junta here expected his reply to the Pan-American peace proposals to reach Washington by tomorrow.

It is believed Carranza will reject the plan.

Gen. Zapata's acquiescence in the plan of Secretary Lansing and the South American envoys is not surprising in view of the fact that Villa, his ally, has consented to a peace conference.

Gen. Scott is expected to arrive here today with a report of his conference with Villa, but whether he will be sent to Mexico City in an effort to win over Carranza has not yet been decided.

REPORT VILLA KILLED
NOGALES, Ariz., Aug. 30.—A rumor that Gen. Villa had been assassinated today, caused Villa currency to reach a new low mark. It was quoted at 110 to 119.
