Monster Aircraft to Carry Over a Ton of Explosives


Now Being Assembled Near Toronto for Use on the British Army Front in Europe

TORONTO, Ont., Aug. 31.—Think of shooting an aerial torpedo equal in power to that which sank the Lusitania, into the Krupp works at Essen, the Zeppelin factory at Friedrichshafen or the big German supply station and fleet at Cuxhaven. The giant biplane that Glenn H. Curtiss is building here for the British army will be able to carry at least eight such projectiles in long flights invading German territory. The bombardments which the British flying officers expect to accomplish with this machine would make previous aerial attacks on German posts seem like exhibitions or fireworks by comparison. Up to this time 100 pounds has been the limit of weight of the bombs dropped from aeroplanes of the small military types in service on both sides. Three or four such bombs exhausted the carrying capacity of the machine when added to the weight of men and gasoline. Aiming the bomb has been a matter of guessing. The accurate range finding and sighting instruments used by artillerymen on ship and shore have not come into use among aviators, chiefly because the loads they carry have not permitted it. One of the principal features of Britain's giant flying machine will be a bomb gun. Its details are a military secret, but I am informed that it has developed surprising accuracy. This gun makes it possible to hurl a projectile containing a 250-pound

charge of gun-cotton at an enemy from a height of a mile or more. The sights make allowance not only for distance, but for the speed of the aeroplane, which may reach 75 miles an hour, throttling down to 40 miles for landing. Built to lift a ton and a half besides its own weight, which is nearly two tons, the big biplane is expected to have lifting capacity in explosives of a ton.

This is in addition to the necessary fuel and oil for a flight of six hours and the weight of two or three men. The new aircraft now being put together here was designed and built largely in the United States by Americans, who assembled here. Its success will aid in restoring the leading place in aviation to the United States, the birthplace of the new science.

HANNA JOINS 'EM

Councilman Hanna Thursday afternoon lined up with Mayor Gill and Councilman Dale in opposing the increase in the 1916 tax budget of \$250,000 to cover bond and redemption interest funds, which a majority of the finance committee asserts is necessary because of the Renick law, and also the increase in street lighting. The remaining members of the finance committee, Councilmen Haas, Fitzgerald and Hesketh, are in favor of the increase.
