HOTEL MANAGER KILLS HIS WIFE, THEN HIMSELF

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 9.—Wm. Armbruster, proprietor of the Hotel George, shot and killed his wife, Eula, and then committed suicide here early today. The bodies were found in the bedroom by Mrs. Chas. Stevenson, Armbruster's mother-in-law.

No shots were heard. The police are at a loss to ascertain a motive for the crime. The couple last night apparently were on good terms. It is believed a jealous quarrel resulted in the tragedy, however. In the dining room at the time the shooting is supposed to have occurred, were the couple's two children, Paul, 9, and Berthold, 3.

Armbruster was a druggist, but had not engaged in his business for several years. He came here from Canada two years ago.

HERE'S KING OF HARD LUCK, BOYS

J. O. Robbins of Milton claims to have a cinch on the title of most unfortunate man. He was sent back to the county jail for another month Thursday when it was announced one of his chief witnesses had broken both legs and could not appear in court.

Robbins is charged with arson. It is alleged he set fire to a chicken coop owned by Edward Duffy. He has been in jail several months, awaiting trial, while his wife, against his wishes, it is said, has been employed by Duffy as housekeeper.

Petitions signed by Robbins' neighbors attest his excellent reputation.

GARRANZA REPLY IS DUE THIS WEEK

WASHINGTON, Sept. 9.—Gen. Carranza's reply to the Pan-American peace conference appeal will arrive here before the end of the week, Consul Silliman at Vera Cruz advised the state department today.

A conference of the delegates will be held afterward.

Meanwhile, officials are keeping a watchful eye on developments around Torreon and Chihuahua, at one of which places it is expected a decisive Carranza-Villa battle will be staged soon.

BANKER-FARMER EDITOR URGES TRUE AMERICANISM

To Miss Mary F. Rausch, assistant professor of home economics at the University of Washington, belongs the distinction of being the first woman ever to address a convention of the American Bankers' association.

Her paper on "The Woman's Side" was a feature of the agricultural section conference at the Moore theatre Thursday morning.

"What the Country Church Can and Must Do" was the subject of Rev. W. W. Diehl, of Hinkley, Ill. Prof. J. T. Newbill, of the Washington State college, spoke on "Boys and Girls."

The agricultural section was organized for the purpose of bringing the banker nearer the country's greatest resource, farming.

R. F. Harris, secretary of the agricultural commission of Champagne, Ill., following his annual report, made a short address. He said in part:

"Our Banker-Farmer program proceeds on the theory that if we are to be a truly great and permanent nation, we must build up a great national life—that while this work lies all about us, the very largest field is in the country surrounding our country banks."

"And all this is to come thru real, aggressive citizenship, and hearty and wholesome co-operation—the two chiefest planks in our platform."

"A great annual meeting of serious men, it seems to me, is not worth while or mention, in these epochal days, if it neglects to say or do some helpful, strong service for the nation—and service makes us all akin."

"The real size and importance of American problems will not be measured by its great membership, and the vast aggregate of capital it represents, but by what it stands for—what it does."

"This nation must come to a wise, orderly, and thorough consideration of American problems of, by, and for unhyphenated Americans."

"Whole-hearted Americanism—prepared from every standpoint, should be our slogan."

HOLD HEARING IN GERBER CASE BEHIND CLOSED DOORS

Behind the closed doors of juvenile court, Judge Dykeman was hearing, Thursday, the third day's testimony in the legal battle of Dr. Rudolph H. Gerber of San Francisco and his wife, Dorothy A. Gerber, for the guardianship of their daughter, Areal, aged 5.

Areal has been named by her grandmother, it is said, as her heir.

Mrs. Gerber, it was said, took the witness stand Thursday morning to refute the charge made by her husband that she has neglected the child.

The mother gained notoriety recently when she was arrested with Ralph M. De Bit, founder of the Yoga cult here, on a statutory charge, which is to be thrashed out in superior court this term.

FEARING HARM, SOUTHERN WOMAN DEMANDS DIVORCE

How Dr. J. Archie De Loach, skilled dental surgeon and specialist on Riggs's disease, romped over three Southern states, imbibing freely of Southern hospitality, disturbing the peace and "making scenes" at the leading hotels, is intimately described in a divorce complaint, which Mrs. Charlotte Margaret De Loach has on file here Thursday.

Dr. De Loach, his wife says, began his hipling career in Ita Bens, Miss., in 1909. She inventories his later acts by days and dates stretching over a period of five years.

A happening at Hot Springs, Ark., in July, 1911, stands out prominently. She declares he cursed and humiliated her before the guests of the hotel at which they were stopping.

On such occasions, she says, he lost all sense of decency and control, and several times was arrested for disturbing the public peace.

In Vicksburg, she relates, in October, 1913, he swatted her with such force he knocked her head against the telephone box, causing her great shame.

At last, following an alleged threat to kill her, she fled for her life from Vicksburg to Seattle.

She asks for \$500 suit money and \$100 monthly alimony. She says her husband is capable of earning easily \$500 a month.

FAMED SCULPTRESS GIVES HER TALENT TO SUFFRAGE CAUSE


