PORTLAND, Or., Sept. 10.—There are not many prophets left in these cynical days, so when I had the chance of making a pilgrimage to the summer home of Dr. William Sunday, I girded up my loins, bought a dozen dry plates and journeyed forth.

Ma told me I could come. "Ma" Sunday is the chief priest and business manager at the home of the prophet.

First you take a train to Hood River, Ore. Then you take a "local" train up into the foothills of Mount Hood.

Seven miles out you dismount in the dust and hike across a field of oats for the little cottage with the big windmill tank. At the door of the cottage I inquired for the prophet. "Mrs. Sunday is up in the tent," was the answer.

"Say, there isn't room for these anywhere," he remarked. "Oh, put them in my trunk; there is always room there for everything," answered Ma.

"We are leaving tomorrow for Omaha; it will be a mighty hot trip across the desert; something fierce," said Mrs. Sunday.

Tells of Plans Then she told me of the plans for the next year, of the cities that would be disappointed, of the engagements that reached out for years and years, of the plans of the campaign in detail.

Out under the pines was Evangelist Billy Sunday, conferring with two hired men on the disposal of the newly threshed oats, sacked in the barn, that Billy and Ma had lugged in two days before, when the "help" was away and it looked like rain.

Billy's Vacation "The day I got back from San Francisco," interjected Billy, "I helped a neighbor make hay. The next day we threshed. Saturday I played ball with the Hood River preachers against the bankers, and we won, 42 to 12. Sunday I preached at Odell, and today I am packing. We leave tomorrow."

That is a fair sample of the prophet's vacation.

"Here is our swimming pool," said Ma, leading me to a big, new cement basin under the giant trees. "Fresh mountain water is piped in and the neighbors come for miles. There's a suit in the house if you want to take a dive."

Some Dinner I think that public tank under the trees, full of mountain water, free to the countryside, is about the finest bit of home missionary work I have seen; you would, too, if you knew Hood River sand and dust and heat waves, and hunted for miles for a swimming pool.

Ma and the prophet took me over the 76-acre ranch, and we talked pigs, bees, chickens and cows, horses, roasting ears, summer fallow and the apple business.

It is not a show place, this home of the prophet in the Oregon hills, but it is a home. Whoever planned it was a farmer and knew how a country home should be made, and loved to work with trees and stock and the good old mother earth.

Then we had dinner. The Joe water and the peach pie, with clotted cream, remain with me as glorious memories, coupled with the fact that Ma insisted that I eat in my shirt sleeves.

The youngest Sunday was garbed in a bathing suit and fresh from a water fight with his brother and some neighbor's boys.

Real American It was just a regular American family, contented, quiet, informal and sincere, and, peering over my peach pie at Ma in her blue calico and Billy in his khaki, I couldn't imagine either of them having any connection with mad-dust trails, emotional campaigns or sin crusades.

Just Plain Bill! The prophet at home is a mighty quiet sort of a chap. I have met

up with scads of evangelists and all the rest of them were different; they either unconsciously posed, were a bit patronizing, or injected their piety into the fried chicken. But Bill was just plain Billy, and the last thing any good guesser would have guessed is what he is.
