POISONED GAS FAILS TO CHECK FRENCH 'DEVILS'

PARIS, Sept. 10.—Germans are attacking heavily in Alsace and the Vosges. Combining rifle fire, use of gas bombs and artillery, they are heavily assaulting the French. At Schratmaennele, the Germans sprayed the lower slopes with fiery liquid, forcing the French out of their positions temporarily, but the impetuous French "blue devils" returned dashing to the attack and hurled the Germans from the captured points, heavily defeating them, the official statement today said.

Clouds of gas from the German lines wafted over the French trenches at Hartmannswillerkopf, but the chasseurs again faced the Germans when the poison cloud lifted and retook the position. Grenade and bomb attacks were violent about Vinne le Chateau and Harazee, the statement claimed, but the results were unimportant. French birdmen continued active, bombarding German batteries at Nonnenbruck and railway stations at Lutterbach and Grand Pre.

BERLIN, Sept. 10.—The Russian center has suffered again from Teutonic battering, it was officially announced. Marshal Von Hindenburg in the Zeleswanka river, and the Bavarians captured Olzanka.

MARRIED HIM FOR HIS MONEY, HEMER AVERS

Superior Judge Albertson ordered J. Henry Hemer, grand recorder of the A. O. U. W., down from the witness stand in his court Friday, saying he had "heard enough filth for one day," and granted Mrs. Pearl A. Hemer, the defendant in the case, a decree of divorce.

Husband and wife had made unsavory charges against each other. Aside from these, Hemer based his action on the ground that his wife was a designing woman, who had inveigled him into marriage to get possession of his property.

Judge Albertson held that Hemer has failed utterly to prove any of the charges he made, and that his wife had likewise been unable to corroborate many of the allegations she made in her cross-complaint.

Married Before
"It appears from the testimony," said the court, "that the wife was a married woman when the husband met her and that he expected to marry her after she got a divorce from her then husband."
"It is very evident that he pressed his attentions upon her and was not inveigled by her, but married from his own choice."

"He testified that he would never have brought this action had he not become suspicious of her relations with other men. There is nothing in the evidence to prove any such thing."

Is Business Woman
"It appears that what property he gave her was given of his own volition. The court cannot grant the husband a divorce."

"If I could see any chance of reconciliation between these two parties or a possibility of their living together again after the charges they have made against each other, I should not issue a decree, but I do not see how a man and wife could live together in civilized society in the face of such charges."



RELATIONS WITH GERMANY ONCE MORE CRITICAL

WASHINGTON, Sept. 10.—A new crisis in American relations with Austria and Germany was reached today.

The issues on which America's future course hung were: Its demand for Austrian Ambassador Dumba's recall because of his activities to cripple U. S. munitions factories.

An unsatisfactory and disappointing note regarding the sinking of the liner Arabic, wherein Germany disavowed indemnity for American lives snuffed out in the disaster and suggested in the event of a difference of opinion on this point submission of the question to The Hague.

The two incidents linked to form a critical situation, Germany is involved in the Dumba incident thru relations of its ambassador with Correspondent Archibald, to say nothing of a reported German plan to carry out a munitions crippling plan similar to Dumba's.
