

**CANCER MAY BE CURED IN EARLY STAGES, SAYS**

PORTLAND, Sept. 10.—If you would avoid contracting cancer, you must observe the following "don'ts":

- Don't hold a pipe always in the same position in your mouth; you'll catch cancer of the lips if you do.
  - Don't rasp your tongue over a roughened tooth; it invites cancer of the tongue.
  - Don't eat your food hot; it irritates the stomach, and tends to bring on cancer affection.

**BERLIN DENIES RUSS CLAIMS TO BIG VICTORY**

BERLIN, via The Hague, Sept. 10.—Scoffing at the Russian announcement of "an important victory" before Tarnopol, the war office issued a statement today, declaring the czar is attempting to deceive his people in order to suppress a growing feeling of revolt.

"The 'important victory' before Tarnopol belongs in the same class as the recent Russian naval victory in the Gulf of Riga," said the statement.

The statement declared the Slavs concentrated Tuesday about Tarnopol, planning to check the Austro-German advance. The first Slav smashes, it was admitted, beat the Teutonic center, but the ground lost to the Russians was recaptured on Wednesday.
