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INVENTS AIR TUBE TO GRIND VALVES

M. F. Buckman, of 1238 Fir st., Seattle, has just completed the invention of a pneumatic air tube for grinding valves in motors, which, he claims, will do the work of at least 25 men using the old method of grinding by hand. The Buckman grinder has an oscillating motion exactly similar to the motion of the hands of a skilled workman; but the grinder, air-driven, performs from 1,000 to 1,500 oscillations a minute. In a recent demonstration, Buckman, using his device, ground valves at the rate of one every 15 seconds, whereas his work by hand requires about 15 minutes. Buckman's grinder is small and weighs but a few pounds. The inventor has patented his device in the United States and Canada.

IS THE CORONER'S JOB A DEAD ONE?

EVERETT, Sept. 20.—Altho the superior court has ruled that the abolition of the office of county coroner is unconstitutional, Snohomish county commissioners are awaiting decision of the supreme court, and are making no appropriations for the coroner's salary meantime.
