POLICE SEEKING MISSING CHILD

Daughter of Smelting Company President Strangely Disappears.

WENT TO A "MOVIE"

Women detectives were vainly endeavoring Tuesday to choose from a myriad possible trails the particular one that, leading from a certain seat in the back row of a Fourth ave. motion picture theatre, might take them to the present whereabouts of Miss Ruth Tanzer, the mysteriously missing 17-year-old Queen Anne high school freshman, of 2409 11th ave. W.

Miss Tanzer, who is the daughter of G. L. Tanzer, president of the Western Smelting & Power company, vanished Sunday night, after she had telephoned her mother that she would be home inside a quarter hour. From that time to this every effort to locate the girl has failed.

What her mother knows of the disappearance was told to The Star Tuesday in the hope that some one who may have seen the girl might be reached thru the newspaper.

"She remained at home while I went out for two hours early Sunday evening," said Mrs. Tanzer. "When I returned she was gone. I thought very little of it at the time, and a few minutes later she phoned me.

"She said she was in a motion picture show and asked if she might call on a girl friend who lives on Tenth ave. I told her she had better not, as it was getting late, and she said, 'All right, mother, I will be right home.'"

Mrs. Tanzer then went to the car line to meet her daughter. She waited 20 minutes in vain, then returned to the house. Failure of the girl to return all that night or on the following day caused Mrs. Tanzer to notify the police Monday evening. The case was assigned to the women's division of the detective department.

"To make sure that Ruth was at the motion picture show," said her mother, "I went there and asked a girl usher, a girl friend of my daughter's. The girl told me she had seen Ruth about 9:30 Sunday night seated in the back row, alone. There were only women in that row, she said."

Fear that Miss Tanzer may have been picked up by kidnapers in an automobile displaying a jitney bus sign, was in her mother's heart Tuesday.

"She often took a jitney," said Mrs. Tanzer. "Miss Tanzer is a striking young woman. She wore a black velvet hat, with a blue plume, had on a black and white sweater coat and a white silk neckpiece. She carried a green silk umbrella.

Her hair is dark brown. She has large blue eyes.

MAKES REPORT ON HAITI FUSS

WASHINGTON, Sept. 28.—Three Americans killed and a score wounded stood today as the total casualties of America's peace efforts in Haiti.

One hundred Haitians have been killed and 200 wounded since the U. S. marines landed, two months ago, to bring order out of chaos in the island republic.

Admiral Caperton's report of the latest trouble with the revolutionists was reassuring.

Shipping continues, but the rebels are submitting to disarmament, except for small bands.

In the north, however, a considerable force forming.

The Haitian congress, now in session, is expected to ratify the treaty providing an American protectorate over Haiti for ten years.

REFUSES TO SIT IN JUDGE'S CASE

Superior Judge Tallman was in no mood Tuesday to hear a case against his associate, Superior Judge Smith. He politely declined, tho the case had been assigned to his department by Presiding Judge Gilliam.

Judge Smith is defendant in the case of the state in its relation to ex-Policeman Paul Schuman, convicted last spring of accepting the earnings of unfortunate women for police "protection."

Schuman appealed from his conviction, but when the transcript of the case appeared before the supreme court, Judge Smith's instructions to the jury were missing, it is alleged. Judge Smith was Schuman's trial judge.

Schuman is now suing for restoration of the records, and Judge Smith will be asked to testify as to what his instructions actually were.

BUSINESS MAN IS FOUND DEAD

Temporary derangement of his mind, resulting from a fall downstairs several weeks ago, is believed by friends of John Lindh, 63, pioneer clothing merchant, to have been the cause of his apparent suicide.

Missing since last Wednesday, his body was found Monday afternoon, on a vacant lot near Erie ave., between E. Spruce and E. Alder. There was a bullet wound in his head and a revolver lay at his side.

The business affairs of his store, at Third and Seneca, are said to be in good condition. Lindh, who was a Knight of Pythias, and a member of the Swedish Business Men's club, lived with his son and daughter, at 2033 11th ave. N.

IS IT A TRAP?

BROWNSVILLE, Sept. 28.—Five hundred Mexicans were reported today to be marching opposite Progresso. Officials, however, believe this to be a feint to attract U. S. soldiers there, while Mexican crossed the river elsewhere. Soldiers have been rushed from the Galveston ranch to a point where the river can be forded.
