**Ever Go Shooting Doughnuts? It's Great Sport, Declare These 'Nuts'**

W. C. Lehman, press agent of the Empress theatre, brought this story to the attention of the city editor and laid it on the city editor's desk:

As a result of a hunting expedition on the private preserve of the Empress, the "doughnut king," Dan Hoyer and Charles Dayton, a couple of sets on the bill at the Empress this week, shot over a thousand doughnuts, which they presented to Manager J. Rush Brown, who in turn will present each patron of the Empress with one of the doughnuts on Saturday afternoon.

Brown has dubbed it "the doughnut method."

Explaining his adventure, Cholly Dayton had this to say about the shoot:

"You must understand, first, that one may have had experience with the tame or fried doughnut, but when one creeps up on a covey of wild doughnuts, he must be of an adventurous nature, for there is no animal so docile as the female doughnut, particularly when she is producing her young."

"I," said he, "is a doughnut, captured on Lard Island. It is a wild doughnut, and shows how it lives in its native state."

"While hunting yesterday, after having been given permission by Mr. Hoyt, my partner and I took our guns, which, by the way, must be single-barreled affairs, otherwise the doughnut cannot be captured."

"We sneaked thru the dough fields, and came onto an island, known as the Island of Lard, taken, probably, from the classics, because the real island of Lard is located in Greece."

"One must be provided with a sufficient quantity of baking soda, which is sprinkled around the island. This causes the doughnuts to rise."

Among the speakers named for the institute, besides Dr. McKeever, are: Mrs. Josephine Preston, state school superintendent; President Buzzallo, of the university; Dr. Frederick Bolton, dean of the school of education; Mrs. Edith Smith Davis, of the National Women's Christian Temperance Union and many others.

Lapsing often into unconsciousness, doctors in attendance feared that she would not recover, the injuries having been sustained on the head.


It was a week later when the first signs of rallying were observed.

**BOARD WILL CUT GATES IN FENCE**

Park Commissioners Listen When Lane's Patrons Howl.

**MERCHANT STANDS PAT**

Wednesday's developments in the strife war between the park board and F. A. Lane, the Leschi park confectioner, forced the belligerent board to budge a bit.

Having built their spite fence, shutting customers out of Lane's store, the board found itself placing the bee upon its own nose, as it were.

Lane said nothing and sawed wood, but—the customers howled.

Lane has a steady trade in bread, among other things. Persons living across Lake Washington have been accustomed to purchasing their loaves before taking the boat home in the evening.

Tosses Bread Over Fence

But with the fence up, certain difficulties presented themselves. It became necessary for Lane to toss the loaves over the obstruction, and for the customers to toss their nickels and dimes over to Lane.

It might have been satisfactory had not some of the customers found difficulty in fielding their loaves. And a loaf of bread which has rolled in the sand is well, it is flinty stuff to masticate.

Now, one of Lane's customers is Francis H. Fassett. He proved to be a fielder, and after he had finished washing the grit out of his teeth that evening he opened up his heart.

Anderson Does the Job

"That fence prevents the public from going when and where it wants to go. It hinders the transportation companies from conducting their business. It keeps the barber and machine shop adjoining Lane's from doing business."

"It is neither of artistic value nor pleasing to the eye."

"And last, but not least, it keeps Lane from selling bread to hundreds who go to and from the Lake Washington district, and that is what the park board wants."

The park board winced, but it still remained up to somebody to budge them. Capt. John Anderson, the steamboat man, did the job.

To Make Holes in Fence

Just what he said of the board to the board, history does not record, but John admits frankly that he could be hanged for what he thought.

The result was, anyway, that the park board, having built its fence, promised to begin sawing holes in it to let persons in and out.

However, the Seattle Electric company, from which Lane leases his store, has informed Lane that material is being purchased with which to build an inclined board walk from the end of the car line street to Lane's front door, thru the embrause made Tuesday by Ed Sakatchewan, Lane's cook.

**200 MARINES DEAD IN SHIP EXPLOSION**

PARIS, Sept. 23.—Between 200 and 300 marines perished when an explosion sank the Italian battleship Benedetto Brin off Brindisi, according to news agency dispatches today. Rear Admiral De Cervin and several other officers are reported among the dead. It is believed to have been an accident.

**ROLPH RE-ELECTED**

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 29.—Mayor James Rolph, Jr., has been re-elected mayor in yesterday's primaries. His majority over his two opponents is expected to exceed 15,000.
