**SUBMARINES NO
 LONGER A PERIL**

British Find Methods to Kill Off and Capture Many Divers.

IS SUB WAR AT END?

WASHINGTON, Oct. 2.—Some remarkable reports in regard to the German submarine warfare are finding their way to Washington.
 That the British have found a way to nullify the submarine activities is stated on excellent authority. It is even stated that already 70 per cent of the German U-boats have been destroyed or captured.
Sub Activity Gone
 The fact which stands out just now is that for some time the news dispatches have failed to announce the loss of any important ships by submarine attack in the vicinity of the British islands.
 How has this been brought about?
 In the first place, it is found that the dirigible and the aeroplane are the natural enemies of the submarine.
 An airship hovering over the water can look down directly into the water and see below the surface as far as a submarine dives, whereas a boat looking slantwise across the water cannot see below the surface. An aeroplane, therefore, or a dirigible, is useful in locating the submarine, and at times even in dropping a bomb upon it.
Scout Boats and Nets
 More effective, however, has been the work of the oil-burning rapid scout boats operating wire nets. These nets are made of strong steel wire, with a 15-foot mesh, with wooden buoys at the top and sinkers on the lower edge, like a huge seine.
 A submarine telephone has also been invented, capable of detecting the approach of a submarine from an observation boat.
 Another instrument used against the submarine is the high-powered gasoline boat, armed with one light gun. Hundreds of these scout in all directions, and if they see a periscope, a shot from the gun does the business.

 As many mothers as possible will be reached by invitations sent out thru all the churches and schools of the city.
 Training of the child, from the day of its arrival to its maturity, will be discussed from every angle.

 Today Ware said the captain paraded on deck before Miss Richardson in his pajamas.
 Ware allowed this was no way for a gentleman to do, whereupon the captain allowed that it was his ship, and he would do as he darn pleased.
