

FAIR BREAKS EVEN. TACOMA, Oct. 4.—Despite unfavorable weather, the Puyallup fair broke even this year, according to President W. H. Paulhaus. Fully 15,000 attended the closing day's exhibition Sunday.

WANT LAW CHANGED. OLYMPIA, Oct. 4.—With Judge Kenneth Mackintosh of Seattle as chairman, a special committee of prosecuting attorneys and judges recommended for passage by the next legislature a law fixing minimum as well as maximum sentences in criminal cases.

OPEN MONDAY EVE. Public night schools will open Monday night with 1,512 students enrolled.

BULGAR PREMIER EXPLAINS MOVE

Tells United Press Why His Nation Has Mobilized Fighting Forces.

INSISTS UPON RIGHTS

LONDON, Oct. 4.—The obstinate refusal of Serbia and Greece to recognize Bulgaria's rights in Macedonia forced the mobilization that has brought Bulgaria to the brink of war. Premier Radoslawoff declared in an exclusive statement telegraphed today to the United Press.

"I can only amplify my recent declaration of reasons why the Bulgarian government has adopted an attitude of armed neutrality similar to that which Switzerland and Holland assumed at the beginning of the war.

"These reasons are both of a military and political character. Events were happening in the different theatres of war, bringing about the near approach of a conflagration in the Balkans.

"The resumption of the Austro-German offensive against Serbia, with a movement of troops in neighboring states, were matters to which the Bulgarian government could no longer remain indifferent.

"Moreover, changes in the political situation following the refusal of Serbia and Greece to recognize Bulgaria's rights in Macedonia, even after clear, explicit recognition thereof by all of the powers, called for a new policy on the part of Bulgaria. Mobilization was, therefore, forced upon us from every point of view."

FRENCH CONTINUE THEIR ADVANCES

PARIS, Oct. 4.—The French continue their progress north of Arras, today's official communique announced.

While the statement did not claim important successes in the Champagne, it asserted that German attacks there had been repulsed.

"We have made further progress in the Givency woods, west of Vimy, and have occupied important cross roads on Hill 119," said the communique.

"The battle from trench to trench around Quenneviers and Nouvron continued yesterday and last night. Near the Navarin farm, in the Champagne, there was heavy bombardment on both sides. Attacks against our newly won positions north of Meuzil were repulsed.

"The French air fleet threw 40 bombs on the Sabions railway station at Metz."

AVIATORS BOMBARD GERMAN NAVAL BASE

AMSTERDAM, Oct. 4.—Six aviators bombarded the German naval base of Zebruggen Sunday. One was shot down and another was forced to land at Nieuwvliet, Holland. The damage at Zebruggen has not been ascertained.

Previous word from official and unofficial sources reported extreme aerial activity by the allies Sunday. Luxembourg was attacked, as well as other places, by a squadron of more than 70 airships.

GERMANS REPULSED IN DVINSK BATTLE

LONDON, Oct. 4.—The struggle for Dvinsk is turning to the advantage of the Russians, according to the Petrograd official statement received here early today.

The German drive for this highly important point apparently lacks the forcefulness which marked the earlier stages of the fight, after the Russians slipped out between the jaws of the Teuton machine around Vilna.

The statement claimed repulse of a Teuton offensive in the Dvinsk region about the railways southwest of Iloukset.

ITALIANS FIGHT IN ZERO TEMPERATURE

ROME, Oct. 4.—Italian troops are battling amid the snow and ice at the head of the Geneva valley and in the Carnac Alps. Winter has set in among the higher peaks, but despite below zero weather at some points, the Italians are maintaining their struggle against the Austrians.

FRANCE WILL HOLD BULGAR RESERVISTS

BERLIN, by Wireless to Tuckerton, N. Y., Oct. 4.—France has ordered that no Bulgarian reservists be permitted to leave the country, according to a Vienna dispatch today.

MINNEAPOLIS VOTES ON PROHIBITION

MINNEAPOLIS, Oct. 4.—Wets and dries lined up today in a sharp contest which will determine the continuance of the saloon in its last great stronghold in Minnesota.

FOR ONE-MAN RULE

Following hot contentions made for a long time by J. L. McPherson, secretary of the Alaska bureau of the Chamber of Commerce, John A. Sletcher, in the current session of the legislature, suggests the administration of Alaska's affairs be vested in an assistant secretary of the interior, with headquarters in Alaska.

SCHOONER GOES DOWN WITH CARGO WORTH HALF MILLION

Wireless messages picked up by the local office of the Marconi Wireless Telegraph Co., in the Smith building, stated Sunday that the liner Hilonian of the Matson Navigation Co., was proceeding down the Coast to San Francisco, following her failure to save the steam schooner Graywood, swamped by heavy seas, off Umatilla reef, in the gale of Friday and Saturday.

The Graywood sank off Neah bay, at midnight, Saturday, according to dispatches here, after the hawser, with which the Hilonian was towing her to this port, parted under the strain of terrific seas.

A small crew, which had been left on the Graywood, was rescued with difficulty. The steam schooner, formerly the Harold Dollar, which was proceeding from San Francisco to Vancouver, B. C., with a cargo of ore and lumber valued at \$500,000, summoned the Hilonian by distress wireless Friday, after the heavy seas had put out her fires.
