DE BIT DENIES TEACHING FREE LOVE RELIGION

Mrs. Gerber Carried From Courtroom Friday in an Attack of Hysteria

DEFENSE IS SURPRISED

"Dr." Ralph M. De Bit, ex-forest ranger and later head of the Yoga cult here, denied on the witness stand in Superior Judge Jury's court Friday that he is, or ever was, an advocate of "free love."

His statement was only one of many high spots in the trial of himself and Mrs. Dorothy Alden Gerber, prima donna and wife of Dr. Rudolph H. Gerber, of San Francisco, accused of injudicious relations.

Mrs. Gerber suffered an attack of hysteria and had to be carried from the courtroom by women friends associated with her and "Dr." De Bit in Yoga work.

During the intermission that followed, De Bit, evidently anticipating that the prosecution would question him concerning his habits of early morning bathing on the beach at Beaux Arts, climbed down from the stand and in a dramatic tone demanded of his attorney:

"Did you send to my hotel for my bathing suit?"

The suit referred to was that of which De Bit testified in preliminary hearing. It was a flesh tint, he said, and might have been mistaken at a distance for no suit at all, possibly.

Spring Surprise Mrs. Virginia Steele, cashier at the Woman's Exchange restaurant, sprung a surprise on the defense when she testified that she had sold a cake to "Dr." De Bit and Mrs. Gerber on February 3.

Mrs. Gerber ordered it sent C. O. D. to Mrs. De Bit at the Sorrento hotel, she said.

Throughout the trial Mrs. Gerber has been frequently shown to have assumed the name "Mme. Isora De Bit."

De Bit on Stand De Bit was on the stand most of the morning.

He testified that he and Mrs. Gerber "consecrated" themselves to the Yoga faith two years ago, in San Francisco, the home of Dr. Rudolph H. Gerber, husband of the accused singer.

Before that time, he said, he was a forest ranger in Idaho, where he was in charge of 850 men.

Flat denial was made by him that he had inscribed the names, "Mr. and Mrs. Ralph De Bit," on the register of the Hotel Sorrento, the register, produced in court, showed a handwriting, it is said, remarkably like his own.

Believes in Morality De Bit admitted the general public might have believed he and Mrs. Gerber man and wife, but added that they always informed followers of their teachings that they were not.

"I believe in the highest kind of morality," he exclaimed. "I am not a believer in free love; decidedly not."

Explaining the occasion on which it was complained to the park board that Yogi children of both sexes were sent in bathing together in the nude, he declared that he had talked it over with Dr. Liburn Merrill.

"I told him we were artists and that our homes were decorated with pictures and sculpture of nudes, and that no one but a man with a diseased mind would find fault with little children going into the water together that way."

The prosecution inquired closely into his means of support. He admitted that he had no salary, but was supported thru donations of students and voluntary offerings for instruction in "spiritual healing and spiritual health."

"The appreciation of my work resulted very substantially," he hastened to say.

The case will likely go to the jury late Friday or early Saturday.

'NOTHER REDLIGHT CASE IS UNDER WAY

Redlight abatement proceedings against the Newport hotel, 1411 1/2 First av., were begun in Judge Albertson's superior court Friday, but came to a sudden halt when Deper declared that a number of policemen witnesses for the state were missing.

Subpoenas were immediately issued by the court and deputy sheriffs sent out to round up the cops. The case was continued until Friday afternoon.
