

IS CARRANZA A JEKYLL-HYDE?

Recognition of "First Chief" a Crime, Say Those Who Know the Man.

derous tyranny more firmly than ever around the throat of mutilated Mexico?

That is the warning contained in the opinions and observations of various persons who since the beginning of the Mexican situation, have been in a position to study and judge Carranza—the man. His record is one of red ruin, they declare, not more brutal than that of Villa's, but more terrible in its consequences because carried out systematically and on a vast scale.

State is Plundered With the passing of Diaz, Carranza turned to Madero, and became governor of the state of Coahuila, a part of which lies along the border of Texas.

The state became demoralized, outlaws plundered and despoiled right and left. Carranza used these "border raids" to discredit Madero. He planned a personal revolution against Madero and then came the murder of Madero, and Huerta assumed power, so Carranza was forced to hide his name.

When Huerta demanded submission from all governors, Carranza and a few followers, taking all available funds, 30,000 pesos, fled for their lives.

Carranza signed the declarations of high ideals framed by his followers while in hiding at Guadalupe. It was this that gave Carranza his chance to play, in the eyes of United States, his role of the savior of Mexico.

The "confiscation of traitors' property" was a clause in his declaration that won him thousands of men eager for the chances for plunder.

In three years Carranza and his people have swelled their 20,000 pesos, or \$15,000, to the millions they now hold.

WAS UNCLE CHEATED

The United States purchased Alaska from Russia for \$7,200,000. The Kennecott copper mine, at the head of the Copper River, Alaska, is now producing each month copper valued at \$1,440,000, it was announced Monday. If it continues to maintain the record of production maintained the past four months, it will, within six months, have produced more than Alaska's purchase price.

U.S. WILL SPRING SURPRISE IN AIR

Board of Experts Will Report on Aeroplane Development

DESIGN A NEW CRAFT

WASHINGTON, Oct. 18.—The utility of battleships, submarines, aeroplanes and dirigibles will be the subject of a separate report from Secretary Daniels to the president, it was learned today.

In the last session of congress there was a strong tendency to favor development of submarines and aircraft to the exclusion of the giant battleships. Daniels has suggested America should have a well-balanced fleet, with the big boats still predominant.

The naval advisory board committee on aeronautics will submit to the president, after its meeting Thursday, a report on military aircraft developments abroad and some of the remarkable developments in America.

The United States has the only self-balancing aeroplane, which practically sails itself, it is learned. The aviator only steers the craft.

Shorett, who, with Ben Shields, proposes to establish a central milk distributing and inspection depot in Seattle, addressing the King County Democratic club Saturday, said producers in the territory tapped by Seattle are paid on an average of 12 cents a gallon for their milk, and the consumer pays 40 cents for it, the difference going to the distributor, who spends much of it in the expenses involved in duplicating the other fellow's route.

The club adopted a resolution endorsing the plan for the depot.

church—"I believe in the Father, the Son, etc."

Then the number of a hymn is announced. You'll find a hymn book in the rack on the back of the pew just ahead of you.

You stand while singing the hymn. You'll enjoy the lusty way those hymns are sung. It fairly raises the roof.

Then you sit down and one of the assisting ministers reads the scripture lesson, some passage from the Bible having bearing on the sermon which is to follow.

Still standing, the Lord's prayer is chanted by the choir and congregation.

Then you sit down, while the choir sings another anthem. Then there is another hymn. After that, the collection is taken.

How Collection is Taken There is considerable ceremony connected with taking the collection. The ushers march to the front in pairs, and stand around the rostrum with heads bowed. The tones from the organ seem very far away.

The big church becomes silent as Dr. Matthews prays, asking for liberality, that the work of the church may go on.

Then the ushers begin systematically covering the church with collection plates. They pass a plate down a row, the congregation handing it from one to another and dropping their nickels and dimes as it passes. While the collection is being taken there is music, either a solo or duet or quartet.

The collection finished, the ushers march to the front again, and the choir sings softly a prayer of thanks.

How Preacher Dresses And then Dr. Matthews, immensely tall thin, and commanding instant attention, rises slowly and without preliminaries begins to preach.

He is clad always in a long black coat, light trousers and a white vest.

In most churches there is a pulpit. But there is none in Dr. Matthews' church. The rostrum is like a lecture platform.

Dr. Matthews preaches with few gestures. The ones he uses are dramatic and effective.

When he points his long forefinger at the congregation and says lowly but tensely, "You sinner!" the congregation squirms uncomfortably and looks to see who the guilty party is.

At the morning service his sermon usually is restricted to a formal discussion of a purely religious theme. In the evening, however, he takes up some matter of current interest, and intersperses his sermon with much practical comment. At times he is bitter in denunciation. He can stir his auditors to a high pitch and then have them smiling the next moment.

You need have no fear of being bored while listening to him.

His sermon Sunday night bore this lengthy title: "The Present Alarming Conditions Were Propheesied and They Call to Seattle Men to Repent."

He had every man, woman and child taking alarmed inventory of their past lives before he had finished.

GERMANS HIT AT BELGIAN LINE

Make Determined Onslaught in Attempt to Break Through

ATTACKS REPULSED

PARIS, Oct. 18.—Advices today indicated the Germans are trying to break the Belgian section of the west front. French artillery continued today to shell many parts of the German western front. In the northern section the artillery and infantry struggle around Bois-En-Hache was turned to the French advantage. Today's official statement told of the repulse of three German attacks there. Further south, to the north of Verdun and Lihons, continual trench fighting and bombardment of German works was reported.

Heavy damage, it was believed, was done by a French aerial bombardment of Treves, in Rhinish Prussia, in retaliation for Zeppelin raids on London.

SHIP TORPEDOED; 71 REPORTED DEAD

LONDON, Oct. 18.—Seventy-one are reported to have perished when an Austrian submarine sank the French steamship Admiral Hemelin in the Mediterranean without warning.

A later Marseilles message said 33 of the crew were landed there, but mentioned no casualties, so it is uncertain whether the 33 include all aboard.
