SIMMS SEES BATTLE GROUND; LOOKS LIKE THE JUDGMENT DAY HE SAYS IN GRIPPING STORY FROM FRANCE

Following is the first story from the bloody Champagne district since the latest fighting began, following the allied new offensive. United Press Staff Correspondent Simms and another newspaperman representing other American newspapermen were the first Americans to visit the field since the battle started.

PARIS, Oct. 20.—In the middle of the Champagne battlefield my first impression was that Judgment day had come; that I had been left behind to roam the disrupted earth alone.

As far as the eye could see along the undulating stretch it was a vast pitted waste of chalk, with snags and annihilated forests sticking up here and there, covered with dust against the skyline and with arms, legs and other fragments of dead men lying, stinking like common garbage, on a titanic dump.

HELL'S FURIES OUTDONE This was the work of the French artillery. Here Germans had been. Here many were still rotting. Hell's furies seemed to have been forestalled and outdone.

For three days I was permitted to wander over this ground recently won by the French.

I had a talk previous to my trip with many at the war office

regarding the efficacy of the French shell fire, but even thus prepared, and despite what I observed personally, I was totally surprised by what I saw.

EVEN RABBITS KILLED

Over many square miles practically no vegetation was left. Even the rabbits and rats had not escaped. Almost 3,000,000 shells had been fired into this area in three days, digging pits from five to 75 feet deep, the latter 130 to 150 feet across.

As a result of this concentrated fire the whole country was covered with a white powder.

A general toll of what the German troops were so demoralized that droves of prisoners the French took were sent to the rear without any other escort than a single guide; that many were almost insane for days.

A MODERN POMPEII

Numerous French regiments have been trying to clean up the battlefield ever since, but without seeming to make headway, so vast is the undertaking.

Their excavations bring to light daily fresh huddles of putrifying Germans, as if they were in some new Pompeii.

What I took to be the stump of a shell-torn bush turned out to be a crisped, red hand on a human arm, protruding from a caved-in trench.

What seemed to be an old sack had a human foot inside.

A discolored blue sweater had

a man's trunk within it. Under the French fire, trenches became graves for the living, while the graves of earlier victims were exposed to the air. The general commanding the French fourth army told me it took two months to prepare this part of the attack. He constructed 500 kilometers of new trenches, some of them wide enough for two horses to pass, together with many new dirt roads.

I personally rode along the new dirt, 13 kilometers long, laid so that the troops and convoys could pass day and night, unseen, owing to cuts and improvised hedges.

When all was ready the artillery cut loose.

BATTLE TAKES ONLY A DAY

The battle, which took two months to prepare, was practically over in one day, as the subsequent fighting was really a settling-down process.

Local attacks and counter attacks are still occurring, but the original result has not been materially changed.

The cannon seem to touch

the wheels. Batteries are everywhere, their crews active in correcting ranges of new enemy positions in response to calls from hidden observers near the German lines or wireless commands from the specks hovering in the sky. Aeroplanes of both sides are constantly busy photographing opposing trenches and plating them.

AIR DUELS ARE FOUGHT

Air duels are an almost hourly occurrence, but usually they result in the invader returning to his own lines, as he has more important work to do than bring down the enemy.

The rat-tat-tat of machine guns in the clouds wins only a passing glance, but every little while one is defeated by the panemionium of anti-aircraft batteries driving away inquisitive aerial enemies.

The combined scream of shells is cyclonic. The French advance was gained with small losses, but even had the Gallic losses been enormous, the Champagne victory would have been cheap.

PAINT STARS AND STRIPES ON VESSEL IN SEATTLE HARBOR TO SAVE HER FROM SUBMARINES

They have painted Old Glory on the sides of the ship Dirigo, riding at anchor with a full cargo of barley off Harbor Island.

They have stenciled in black letters ten feet high along her bows the name DIR-I-G-O.

MARINER KNOWN HERE IS INJURED

Former Second Officer of Calchas Struck by German Shell

LOSES BOTH HIS LEGS

There were solemn faces aboard the Blue Funnel liner Calchas, lying in drydock here Wednesday, when word came that her former second officer, Fred R. Richardson, had been struck by a shell from a German submarine when the liner Diomed was sunk off Liverpool six weeks ago.

Richardson, who had been promoted from the Calchas to the place of first officer of the Diomed, lost both his legs. They were carried away clean by the shell.

His captain and two of the crew were killed. Five of the crew drowned as the vessel sank.

As an officer of the Calchas, Richardson was well known along the water front here. The letter telling of his injury caused general grief.

He is married and has two children living in England. Richardson left the Calchas in Glasgow on a Thursday. He joined the Diomed on Friday, left Liverpool on Saturday, and met the enemy on Sunday.

"They chased us for three hours," his letter says. "The first we noticed of them was when one of the men in charge of the gun we had near our bow."

"We were so anxious to get a shot at the Germans that nearly all of the crew armed themselves with rifles and got up into the rigging. It was a long wait, and our engines were pounding their best when the submarine's periscope came in sight."

"Nearly every man fired, but before we could get the big gun trained on her she was gone again. Suddenly she rose and fired. I heard somebody yell, and when I looked up our master was gone off the bridge. Then something struck me. When I became conscious I was lying on a cot."

BULGAR GAINING

BERLIN, Oct. 20.—Bulgarians have captured Sultana Tepe, in Serbia, with 2,000 prisoners and 12 cannon, said today's official statement.

The Austrians are moving forward toward Shabat. The Serbians were defeated south of Lucia and Bozevac.

CALL RESERVES

ROME, Oct. 20.—Italy today called to the colors four more classes of reserves, thus completing her mobilization. No official explanation was given, but rumors followed that the additional forces were for Balkan service. These reports were strengthened by official admission that no more troops are needed at the Austrian frontier.

SEIZE 2 CITIES

LONDON, Oct. 20.—Bulgarian capture of Istip and Cotfana, 50 miles inside of Serbia, was reported by an Athens dispatch today.

CLAIM VICTORY

PARIS, Oct. 20.—Repulse of German attacks everywhere along the western front was claimed in an official summary of the past week's events, issued by the war office today.

Eight thousand were the Teuton losses in the Loos and Souchez battlefields alone, it was claimed.

SLAVS ADVANCE

LONDON, Oct. 20.—As a result of the Russian success in breaking the Strypa river line, Austrians have evacuated Czernowicz, according to Bucharest dispatches today.

ASQUITH BETTER

LONDON, Oct. 20.—Premier Asquith passed a satisfactory night and was improved at daylight, tho he will be confined today, said his physicians' bulletins.

ACCUSE BULGAR

LONDON, Oct. 20.—"With bleeding hearts," the Slavs have been forced to draw the sword against their one-time friend, Bulgaria, said an imperial manifesto received today from Petrograd.

This announced to all Russians that Bulgaria had been perfidious to Russia, the assurance of Macedonia thru other means than war on Serbia.

EMBARGO PUT ON MEXICAN ARMS

President Wilson Signs Order to Help Carranza End Fighting

GEN. VILLA HARD HIT

WASHINGTON, Oct. 20.—President Wilson today signed an embargo against shipping arms and ammunition to the opponents of Carranza.

The embargo affects Villa and the other factions opposed to Carranza, whose government the United States has officially recognized.

All munitions consigned to other factions will be held up.

The president's step is regarded as a determined move to put an end to fighting in Mexico. It is believed all other republics of the Western hemisphere will follow the action of the United States and the six Latin-American countries.

Each of these six countries will send an ambassador to the recognized Mexican government in the near future.
