## TWO COLUMNS OF LIVE NEWS BRIEFLY TOLD

**Plead Guilty of "Moonshining"**  
FORT SMITH, Ark., Oct. 20.—Seven men, under indictment for a wholesale "moonshine" conspiracy to defraud the United States out of millions over a period of years here, pleaded guilty today. They will be sentenced Thursday.

**Wenatchee Man Disappears Here**  
Friends of Carl Simonton, 23, former secretary of the Wenatchee Commercial Club, who came here 10 days ago to have his eyes treated, are alarmed Wednesday over his disappearance. He has been missing for a week. His absence was not noted for some time, as he was supposed to be in his room at the Arctic club, under command of his physician to keep the room darkened.

**Sentenced to 28 to 68 Years**  
Fred Starr, confessed bandit, stood Wednesday facing a term of 28 to 68 years in the penitentiary for single-handed robberies of the Everett interurban and North Queen Anne street cars. Sentence was imposed late Tuesday, after he pleaded guilty before Judge Gilliam.

When he has completed 20 years, imposed for the Seattle crimes, Starr will be taken to California to serve an uncompleted term in San Quentin for eight years more. He could still be given an additional term of five years for attempting to break jail here, Sept. 19.

**Press Club to Honor Suzzallo**  
President and Mrs. Henry Suzzallo, of the university, will be guests of honor at a reception and dance at the Press club Wednesday night. Dr. Suzzallo was one of a merry crowd of Stanford alumni, who gathered in reunion at the Washington Annex Tuesday night, and declared, in a speech, "Stanford's best spirit shall be reproduced in the University of Washington, but loosened and modified by its own aspirations."

**Humorist to Talk About Heroes**  
Ralph Parlette, the lecturer-humorist, who has delivered the one lecture on "The University of Hard Knocks" more than 2,000 times, and who is to open the Star Lyceum course season at the Y. M. C. A. Saturday night with a lecture on "My Father's Business," has been engaged to remain over Sunday and give a free lecture for men at the Sunday club mass meeting on "Hurras and Heroes."

**Here to Establish Free Art School**  
Miss L. A. Mint, of Philadelphia, director of the National Liberal Arts and Science League, is in Seattle for the purpose of establishing a free art school here, as she has done in a number of other cities.

Miss Mint lectured Tuesday night on "Art and Drawing," in the assembly rooms of the Northwestern Shorthand Reporting school, and she will conclude her series of talks on Thursday night of this week.

**Supreme Court Judge Very Ill**  
OLYMPIA, Oct. 20.—Little hope is held out today for the recovery of Judge Herman D. Crow, of the supreme court, who is confined at St. Peter's hospital. He was operated on two months ago in Seattle. His son, Denton M. Crow, of Tulare, Cal., is at his bedside.

**Runs Into Officer's Arms**  
Shortly after 2 o'clock Wednesday morning, Officer J. J. Reilly heard cries of "Stop thief!" and was nearly knocked over by a swiftly running man in the lower part of the city. The man was arrested and is held on an open charge. He gave the name of Orville Musselman, and explained at headquarters that a stranger, who had asked him to his room, 107 the Northern Pacific hotel, had led the way thru an alley where Musselman declared he saw an armed man waiting. Musselman is alleged by the police to have participated in several holdups recently.

**Detective Guilty of Jury Tampering**  
TACOMA, Oct. 20.—W. W. Winard, a well-known private detective here, today faces sentence of a year in jail or a fine of \$1,000, or both, as the result of tampering with witnesses in a red-light abatement case. He was convicted yesterday upon a second trial before Judge Ronald, of Seattle. The first case ended in a disagreement.

**Citizens Kill 10 Mex Suspects**  
BROWNSVILLE, Texas, Oct. 20.—Their wrath kindled by the daring holdup of a Prisco train yesterday, citizens here today, for the most part, had the law in their own hands, prepared to deal summarily with any Mexican who failed to give a good account of himself. Already 10 Mexicans have been killed by Americans as a result of the holdup, and five others are held prisoners in the Brownsville jail.

Authorities, however, are doubtful of the safety of the five suspects.

**Who Stole Missionary Books?**  
Here's a case for a detectaf with a well-developed faculty of deduction.

An express package of 30 missionary books has been stolen from the First Presbyterian church, Seventh ave. and Spring st., by some peculiarly constituted thief, according to a complaint lodged with the police by Mrs. N. M. Singleton, 1224 16th ave. N.

**The Green Elks' Tooth Gone**  
Loss of a jeweled elk's tooth, valued at \$200, was reported to the local police by F. L. Green, of Seattle, by long distance from Tacoma, Tuesday.

**Trial Flight Scheduled Today**  
The first experimental flight of the big \$10,000 hydro-aeroplane, bought by W. E. Boeing, millionaire lumberman, president of the Northwest Aero club, with a hangar on Lake Washington, will be made Wednesday afternoon, if weather conditions are favorable and the necessary mechanical adjustments are completed in time. Floyd Smith, of the Martin School of Aviation, who is official tester for that company, will put the machine in working order before he turns it over to the Seattle flyers.

The machine is the very latest in design and practically identical with those used in the army and navy. Its wings spread 50 feet. It is equipped with a 125 horse power six-cylinder engine, and has a speed of 90 miles an hour, and power to attain a height of 1,000 feet in seven minutes with a load of 1,000 pounds.

**15 Killed in Powder Plant**  
BUTTE, Mont., Oct. 20.—Fifteen mangled bodies and two more dying, was the toll listed today as the result of the giant powder explosion at the Granite Mountain mine yesterday. All have been identified. Workers prying under debris near the mouth of the mine unearthed a part of a skull and leg and remnants of human flesh, indicating one more victim whose name may never be learned.

**Mrs. Maud Booth Speaks Here**  
Before a large gathering in the Grand opera house, at noon Wednesday, Mrs. Maud Ballington Booth, of the Volunteers of America, spoke on her work of prison reform. Mayor Gill presided.

Mrs. Booth is founder of the Volunteer Prison league, which has a membership today of more than 85,000 convicts. It was started in Sing Sing prison, 10 years ago.

She is known as the "Little Mother" to members of the league. Mrs. Booth will speak at Dreamland pavilion Wednesday evening.

**Trefz to Address Noon Meeting**  
Edward F. Trefz, field secretary of the National Association of Chambers of Commerce, will be the speaker at the Butler Thursday noon, at a luncheon given under the auspices of the membership committee of the Seattle chamber.

**Child Welfare Meeting Thursday**  
Seattle Federation of Women's clubs will hold a conference on child welfare Thursday evening in the Commercial Club rooms. The speakers will be Mayor Gill, Judge Dykeman, Dr. Lilburn Merrill, Dr. Sarah E. Kendall, Mrs. Donna Snook, G. Wright Arnold, James Callahan and Cleon B. Roe. Dr. Ella G. Stone will preside.

**Wife Scolds Him; He Takes Poison**  
TACOMA, Oct. 20.—When accused by his wife of conduct unbecoming a good and faithful husband, F. W. Foster swallowed three mercury tablets and is in a dangerous condition in a hospital today from the effects of the poison.

Foster is an employe of the Northern Pacific railroad.

**A Chance for Local Lumber Bid**  
Local lumber mills are given an opportunity to submit bids to supply 7,778,000 feet of fir for the use of the government in Panama canal work, including everything, from fine ceiling to large dimension work. Delivery is asked at Colon between Jan. 1 and March 1, 1916.

**A "Made-in-Washington" Dinner**  
Under the auspices of the Ladies' Aid society of the Woodland Park Baptist church, the Home Consumers' league entertained by giving a "Made-in-Washington" dinner, followed by a stereopticon lecture, and musical and literary program, Tuesday evening. The pictures were of an educational nature, showing manufacturing and governmental activities.
