## CONTRACT AWARDED FOR BULKHEADING

The Puget Sound Bridge and Dredging Co. was Wednesday awarded the contract for filling and bulkheading East Marginal way, on a bid of \$80,957. The award was made by the board of public works, on recommendation of the council.

## BIG INCREASE IN EXPORTS IS SHOWN HERE

Encouraging gains, not only in foreign exports and imports, but in domestic business as well is shown by the report issued Thursday by Port Warden A. A. Payne, for the month of September, 1915.  
Foreign exports for the past month totaled \$1,782,293, as compared with \$1,026,128, of the corresponding month of 1914, a gain of \$756,165. The Orient took most of outbound shipments, totalling \$726,530, England ranking a close second.  
Domestic exports to Alaska, Hawaiian Islands and points on the Pacific and Atlantic coasts, were considerably larger in September, 1915, than in the same month of 1914. The 1915 totals are \$5,315,801 as compared to \$3,441,985 of 1914, showing an increase of \$1,873,816.  
Domestic imports also took a big jump. The total was \$10,512,711, a gain of \$3,192,039 over September, 1914.  
The grand total of exports for September were \$7,298,094; for the same month in 1914, \$4,468,113.

## EVANS IS FREED IN SECOND TRIAL

After spending nearly a year in the county jail, charged and later convicted of accepting the earnings of an unfortunate woman, I. G. Evans, former proprietor of the American hotel, Westlake and Pike sts., is Thursday free thru the "not guilty" verdict of a jury which tried him a second time.  
Evans got a new trial when it was learned that a woman member of the first jury stepped out of line en route to the jury room to get a drink of water and was not with her jury-mates when the deliberation started. Evans was found not guilty in 10 minutes Wednesday.

## SOCIETY SHOW AT HIPPODROME DRAWS LARGE ATTENDANCE

Every bit a good show, and with several hundred of the best-known young women of the city taking part in the various vaudeville acts, the society circus at the Hippodrome this week is the place where the crowds are going nightly.  
Early 2,000 attended the circus Wednesday night, contributing their bit to charity in the form of a small admission at the gate.  
A special children's matinee has been arranged for Saturday afternoon. The admission price will be cut and a special program arranged for the entertainment of the little folks.
