Notified that his son, Lauritz Birkeland, was dying, after six operations in the Seattle General hospital, Capt. K. B. Birkeland, president of the Pacific Sea Products Co., has reached here from Seward, Alaska, in time to see the lad still alive, altho the steam whaler Unimak, on which he made the trip, was tied up six days in a storm at Kodiak Island. The father rushed to the hospital and remained all Sunday with his boy. He was reported very low Monday.

HOLD ARENA DECISION UNDER ADVISEMENT
University regents will not decide until their November meeting upon the acceptance or rejection of the Arena building, at Fifth ave. and University st. No action was taken Saturday. Protest has been raised against the construction, which is said not to be Class A, fire-proof.

TEACHERS FAVOR VOCATIONAL TRAINING
Several thousand teachers who attended the Washington Educational association convention here last week had returned home Monday, leaving resolutions demanding a higher standard of teachers' requirements, and advocating the extension of vocational and industrial training. The convention closed Saturday, with an address by Dean Halliet, of New York.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 1.—Great Britain has consented to the abrogation of the trade treaty with the United States which would have prevented operation of the La Follette seamen's act as far as the Britishers were concerned.

They were fished out of the bay by the crew of a switch engine.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 1.—Mrs. Wm. S. Bolling, mother of Mrs. Norman Galt, the perturbed, was not injured when a deadly gas generated for an insecticide drove her from her apartments. Miss Louise Roberts, another occupant of the building, however, was killed by the gas.

LIQUOR LAW UP IN U. S. SUPREME COURT
WASHINGTON, Nov. 1.—The United States supreme court today ordered argument of the West Virginia liquor cases, involving constitutionality of the Webb-Kenyon law.
This law prohibits the transportation from a wet state to a dry state of any liquors for the purpose of sale within the dry unit.

ALASKA LIFE STATIONS TO GET \$500,000
WASHINGTON, Nov. 1.—Nearly \$500,000 will be spent on life-saving stations and lighthouses for the Alaskan coast, if plans of Lighthouse Commissioner George Putnam are approved. His estimates show that the government, in connection with its rail building in Alaska, will spend more to save ships and lives there than on any other American coast.

WHALING STEAMERS HAD A GOOD SEASON
