HOW TO TAP PORK BARREL



The general staff of the army has worked out a system for abandoning the old, useless posts now maintained all over the country, and concentrating the mobile regular army of the United States into not more than EIGHT great commands.

The staff recommended that TWO GROUPS be placed on the line between the St. Lawrence and Atlanta, covering the Atlantic seaboard. The first of these is at Fort Porter, Buffalo, N. Y., marked "1." The second is located at Fort Oglethorpe, Georgia, where a cavalry brigade should be located, and Fort McPherson, Atlanta, Ga., and is marked "2."

TWO GROUPS (and possibly three) should be placed on the line between Puget sound and Los Angeles, covering the Pacific seaboard. The first of these it recommended be concentrated at Fort Lawton, Wash. (near Seattle), and Vancouver Barracks, Wash. (near Portland).

These posts are near the center of the Puget sound strategic group, and one or both of them should be retained as stations in the group.

The second groups should be placed at the Presidio of San Francisco, Cal., and the Presidio of Monterey, Cal. One or both of these posts may properly be included in the California strategic group. These groups are marked "4" and "5" on the map.

THREE GROUPS between the Great Lakes and the Rio Grande, serving as first reserves for either seaboard and as nuclei for the development of the national guard and volunteer forces to be organized in the interior of the continent. These are marked "3," "6" and "7" on the map.

In addition Fort Sill, Okla., should be retained, as this large reservation is peculiarly adapted for use as a school of artillery and musketry fire. It is marked "8."

OUR YEARLY WASTE

This is what the war department could save ANNUALLY if the 59 mobile army posts in continental United States were consolidated into not more than eight army posts:

Quartermaster's department	\$5,036,138
Subsistence department	220,000
Medical department	91,800
Pay department	159,100
Total estimated saving	\$5,507,038

This saving would, if devoted to military purposes, enable TEN REGIMENTS OF INFANTRY, with an enlisted strength of 900 men each, or 9,000 ADDITIONAL MEN, to be added to the mobile army. Or, it would enable each company, troop and battery of the mobile army to be INCREASED BY 20 PRIVATES, allowing \$500 a year per man.

And, the abolition of useless posts would increase the number of effective officers and men in the army by RETURNING TO DUTY THOSE NOW ON EXTRA AND SPECIAL DUTY NECESSITATED BY THE MAINTENANCE OF THESE USELESS POSTS. This is estimated at 5 PER CENT of the total strength of the army.

All of this does not take into account the coast artillery corps, nor the foreign garrisons. It refers only to posts maintained for the mobile army or field troops of the United States.

What the "Forts" Are

These "forts"—what are they? Well, "Fort" D. A. Russell, at Cheyenne, Wyo., is a shining example. This "fort" is maintained principally to keep Senator Warren solid with the merchants of Cheyenne.

It was established in 1867 to protect the Union Pacific railroad from the Arapahoe Indians. It has been useless for many years.

Two troops of cavalry are stationed there. A few years ago there was a hurry call for these troops of cavalry. They were needed on the Texas boundary.

Ah! Here's the Reason

"Fort" Douglas at Salt Lake City, and "Fort" Missoula, in Montana, and "Fort" Wayne in Detroit, and "Fort" Snelling at St. Paul, for example.

Reporting to congress in 1912, Henry L. Stimson, then secretary of war, said:

"Past experience shows that it is in general a difficult matter for the war department to abandon posts situated in the vicinity of cities.

"Post so situated are a source of revenue to the business men of the community thru the articles purchased by officers and men and the supplies obtained by the quartermaster's and subsistence departments for the upkeep of the post.

"The post itself serves as a recreation park for the citizens, where they can listen to a band concert and watch the various drills of the troops."

Cost \$5,500,000 Annually

"Against such practical and plainly evident reasons for the maintenance of a post near his home town, the average citizen is apt to attach little importance to projects based on pure military necessity, and in which he is apt to take but very little interest."

So the army goes on spending five and a half million dollars a year in wasteful expenditure, when it might be devoting the money to building up the national defense.

If this congress proves more patriotic and public-spirited than previous ones, it has an opportunity to contribute measurably to the national defense without spending this money uselessly.

RUSS WARSHIPS BOMBARD VARN TO LAND TROOPS

BUCHAREST, Nov. 1.—A Russian transport fleet was sighted Sunday.

It was escorted by destroyers and was approaching Varna, Bulgaria, with transports bringing up the rear.

Russian warships began bombarding the port, apparently in anticipation of landing the troops.

VASHON FOLK TO VOTE ON FERRY

Public meetings are to be held immediately over Vashon and Manly islands to discuss the question of county ferry terminals, and on Dec. 4, the same day as the general port election, the people of the two islands will vote upon the ferry matter.

This was decided at a meeting of 100 property owners from the islands at Good Eaters cafeteria Saturday.

Three proposed routes for the ferry are suggested: From Vashon to Three Trees Point, from Portage to Des Moines, or from Vashon Heights direct to the Seattle waterfront.

EDITOR HELD ON CHARGE BY GIRL

OLYMPIA, Nov. 1.—F. E. Seeley, 54, editor of the Okaville, Wash., World, is in jail here today without bail, awaiting arraignment, on charges that are to be filed against him in the superior court by Prosecuting Attorney Yantle today.

Seeley was arrested yesterday with Offie Erickson, 21, of Tacoma, at a hotel here on information furnished by the girl's mother.

Mrs. Erickson said her daughter had read a want ad in a Tacoma newspaper, in which Seeley stated he wanted a girl to learn the printing business. The girl made a previous trip to Olympia and had received a letter from Seeley last week, inclosing money for her expenses.

According to the mother, the letter also made promises of a trip to California and "life like a millionaire."

BRITISH SEIZE AMERICAN SHIP

WASHINGTON, Nov. 1.—A British prize crew seized the American steamship Llana, grounded off Scotland, yesterday, according to the Dundee consul's report to the state department today. No reasons were assigned.

Consul Young, at Halifax, wired the American vessel Hocking, formerly the Danish vessel Gronland, reported to be in the British black list, was brought into Halifax yesterday, after being halted off New York by British warships.

ARIZONA ALIEN LABOR LAW IS HELD INVALID

WASHINGTON, Nov. 1.—Arizona's alien labor law was held unconstitutional by the supreme court of the United States today.

The law provided that an employer of over five persons must have 90 per cent of them qualified electors or native citizens.

It was adopted under the initiative.

CHAMBER WILL TEST NEW LEVY

The Chamber of Commerce Saturday retained Hughes, McMicken, Dovel & Ramsey to start action at tempting to enjoin county officials from levying and collecting the city's taxes, as adopted by resolution of a majority of the council, on the ground that the resolution was illegal.

The King County Democratic club has invited Councilman Erickson and Mayor Gill to give their views on the levy, at the next meeting, Saturday noon.

QUESTION MAKING LEVY BY RESOLUTION

Whether the Municipal League will go into court with the question of the legality of the resolution method of adopting Seattle's budget will be decided at the weekly luncheon of the organization at the Hotel Washington Annex Tuesday noon. Mayor Gill will give his views on the subject.

The board of trustees of the league, at its meeting Friday, endorsed the report of the municipal finance committee, recommending that the question be taken into court.

The trustees authorized the appointment of a committee of lawyers to make an investigation as to the legal aspects of the resolution.

DAUGHTER WED; FATHER, ANGRY, KILLS 3 PERSONS

WINNSBORO, Tex., Nov. 1.—Fired by anger at his daughter's marriage, Perry Morris, a wealthy farmer, killed three persons and seriously wounded a fourth, then went home and killed himself.

The tragedy started at the home of J. P. Sheets, who married Morris' daughter; against the father's approval. Morris killed Sheets and seriously wounded Sheets' son by a former marriage.

Then, to complete his vengeance, Morris went to the home of C. J. Maddox, whom he believed had endeavored to break the marriage, and killed both Maddox and his wife.
