## PRESS CLUB OFFICIALS ARE 'ARRESTED'

Six highly incensed members of the Press club appeared in Judge Gordon's court Wednesday, in angry mood, to answer charges of violating city ordinances, preferred by Police Chief Lang. They were arrested Tuesday night, at the behest of Lang, for pasting posters on downtown sidewalks.

The posters were to advertise the club's annual ball and links Friday night at the Hippodrome. The alleged culprits included John Evans, president; Sidney Smith, secretary; S. R. Battenfield, treasurer; James B. Nelson, C. Rowell Marshall and E. E. Carpenter, trustees. They were represented by a dozen lawyers, including Crawford White, who engaged in several sharp tiffs with City Attorney Van Ruff, and who pointed out that Sidney Smith seemed to be charged as the chief offender. But the Judge argued that Smith is only a little fellow, led on, perhaps, by the others, and that altho an ordinance may have been violated, no harm was meant. The case was continued to next Tuesday.

## RUBY RETURNS FROM ARCTIC ADVENTURES

With her sails in shreds and her rudder broken, the power schooner Ruby arrived in port Tuesday in tow of the U. S. life saving tug Snohomish, after battling for 17 days with the heaviest seas ever experienced by her master, Capt. S. F. Cottle. Capt. Cottle, in the Ruby, took supplies to Viljahuur Stefanssen at Bathurst, near the mouth of the Mackenzie river, and says the explorer was enthusiastic over his venture.

## EUROPE WILL RECOGNIZE CARRANZA, TOO

WASHINGTON, Nov. 3.—The European allies will recognize Carranza as soon as Italy prepares a note in their behalf, the state department was advised today.

## PROBE GROUNDING OF BIG LINER

VICTORIA, B. C., Nov. 3.—An abnormal set of the tide to the westward and the failure of the fog horn at Point Wilson, were the reasons set before the marine court of inquiry Tuesday for the stranding of the Blue Funnel liner Cefas off the point on Oct. 9.

Capt. J. D. MacPherson, assisted by Capt. Alan Davis and Capt. F. Anderson, presided over the investigation commission.

## DR. GELHORN TALKS ON INFANT TRAINING

Dr. Walter Gellhorn, one of Seattle's leading baby specialists, told a group of mothers at the university headquarters of the public libraries Tuesday night, that infant mortality would be reduced to a great extent if mothers would feed their youngsters as nature intended, not by artificial methods.

Following the address, a demonstration on nursing was given. The mothers were shown how simple it is to make mustard and flaxseed poultices, how to take temperature, and other sick room accomplishments.

Dr. Gellhorn will speak next Tuesday evening on artificial feeding. The lectures constitute a mothers' training school, being given by the University Mothers' club.

NEW YORK, Nov. 3.—With \$1,740 in new bills wrapped around his legs, Albert Verkayok, a boatman, was arrested here early today and tried to buy his freedom with his roll. Authorities alleged he was connected with Robert Fay, German bomb plotter.

Howe, who attacked the constitutionality of the "dry" law.

## WON'T ACCEPT S. E. COMPANY MONEY

OLYMPIA, Nov. 3.—The public service commission will not accept the offer of \$10,000 with which to obtain the valuations of the property of the Seattle Electric Co. The company made the offer when the commission declared itself unable to go ahead with the valuations because of legislative failure to provide the money. The company's complaint, asking for relief from certain franchise obligations is based upon figures to be obtained from a valuation of its properties. The commission, after a conference with the company's attorneys, agreed to hear the complaint on Feb. 16, accepting for the present the company's own figures and those to be submitted by the city of Seattle.
