CONGRESS CAN SHAKE  
OFF WAR TRUST GRIP,  
ONE MEMBER WRITES

Cordova, Ill., Nov. 15.—The war trust, to which war means staggering profits, is tightening its grip on America.

It will be recalled that the United States Steel corporation, the original steel trust, was able to escape dissolution on the ground that it really controlled but 50 per cent of the iron and steel production. Now a new steel trust has been formed to pick up the scattered ends overlooked the first time.

A COMPLETE MONOPOLY IS THEREFORE NEARER TODAY THAN EVER BEFORE.

All the two trusts have to do to have Uncle Sam, and, indeed, the whole world, at its mercy, is to simply have a nice little "gentlemen's agreement" not to indulge in any but sham competition.

To every one EXCEPT THE WAR TRUST war means misery, poverty, torture, desolation and death.

But to the J. P. Morgans and other stockholders of the war trust means a harvest of gold.

On my dear I have a weekly stock market letter. It is issued by a New York firm of stock brokers. I will quote a few of the headlines: "Winchester Arms up 1,000 points—Colt's Arms up 100 points—Electric Boat up 100 points—Du Pont declares stock dividend of 200 per cent."

Take Bethlehem Steel stock. At the outbreak of the war this stock sold at \$30; today it is selling at \$450.

If you had \$30 invested in this stock, your profit on account of war would have been \$420. Imagine what the profit must have been to the Wall st. war trust magnates who owned millions of dollars worth of these munition company stocks!

Behind the war trust is the most powerful group of men in the United States, if not in the civilized world. Its control is in the hands of the same group of money kings that rule the express companies, the telegraph companies, the railroads, the steamship lines, the money trust and the great insurance companies and industrial trusts.

It is not to the interest of these men that the European war be brought to a speedy close. The more war, the more profits. To these men peace would be a calamity.

The war trafficking mongers are the only ones to whom war is profitable. Why not make war unprofitable even to them by taking all profit out of war and preparation for war?

Congress could do it easily by simply REQUIRING THE GOVERNMENT TO MANUFACTURE ALL ITS OWN MUNITIONS AND SHIPS IN GOVERNMENT ARSENALS, NAVAL AND SHIPBUILDING YARDS, which would mean a saving of millions to the taxpayers.

If you want to render a patriotic service to your fellow men and your republic, Mr. Reader, see to it that your congressman takes YOUR side in this controversy.

CHICAGO, Nov. 17.—Ring the bells softly; there's crepe on the door again.

Secretary Hamburger of the National Garment Workers, said today that clothing will cost more this winter, because Europe is demanding enormous quantities of wool for soldiers' blankets.

ERICKSON SWATS MINORITY IN COUNCIL

"When nine councilmen sit around the table for a month, preparing the budget and then I have a majority, I don't think that after a budget is approved by a majority of the council, the minority should rip it up the back because the mayor doesn't approve of the levy."

Councilman Erickson, addressing the Municipal league Tuesday, at the Washington Annex, thus expressed his attitude on the tax levy controversy.

"The minority has made a foul tackle," he added.

Referring to the proposed increase of street lighting rates to 4 1/2 cents per kilowatt hour, he said that it was lower than any rate furnished in any of the larger cities, and that by raising street rates the rates to home consumers could be lowered.

He referred to the Renick act as the "most outrageous piece of legislation put on the statute books in this state. It is a damnable bill."

WILL'S FRIENDS GIVE HIM A BANQUET

Congressman Will E. Humphrey, on whose recommendation the government purchased the "frog pond" postoffice site, was honored at a banquet at the Washington Annex Tuesday night.

He will represent Washington, D. C., late this week.

Ex-Senator Piles, Will H. Thompson, Judge H. E. Hadley and Judge George Donworth spoke at the banquet.

NEW STEAMER FOR SEATTLE-TACOMA RUN

Another freight steamer costing \$10,000, to operate between here and Tacoma, will be built by the Lillooet Transportation Co., which now owns the freighter Amazon, on that run. Bids for the new vessel will be called for soon.

PLAN TO JUNK OLD GERMAN FREIGHTER

The bulk of the old German freighter Marlechen, sunk in Seattle harbor ten years ago, is to be salvaged and sold for junk by Capt. C. M. Sheafe, 1014 First ave. She lies off Salmon bay.

SEIXAS APPOINTED TO ELECTION JOB

Fred Seixas has been appointed by the county commissioners to act as their representative in selecting men qualified to act as precinct officials to supervise registration for the next election.

Seixas will draw a salary of \$5 a day.

The last legislature made it obligatory upon the commissioners to appoint registration officials in each precinct. The work of finding men to fill these places, the commissioners decided, was too weighty a task for themselves to perform, inasmuch as there are 120 precincts in the county.

LUNDIN TO OPPOSE PRISONER'S RELEASE

Prosecutor Lundin has been informed by wire from Walla Walla that an attempt is being made there to obtain the release from the penitentiary of Angelo Bianchi, a criminally insane convict, thru habeas corpus proceedings.

Lundin hurried a communication to Prosecutor Earl W. Benson, of Walla Walla county, asking him to arrange for a continuance of Bianchi's hearing.

Lundin stated he would not agree to the man's release without trial here, after the manner of similar cases heard here.

Bianchi shot Frank Harris here October 20, 1911, but was found not guilty because of insanity.

NEW STEAMER FOR POULSO-SEATTLE RUN

Contract for an \$80,000 passenger steamer, to ply upon Puget sound, between the north end of Kitsap county Transportation Co., to Joseph Supple, Portland ship builder. The craft will have a speed of 22 miles an hour. It will be placed on the run between here and Poulsbo, to replace the Hyak.

WILL LECTURE ON SOUND KELP INDUSTRY

Prof. George B. Rigg, of the botany department of the university, will lecture Wednesday night at the university on "The Status of the Kelp Industry," illustrating his talk with pictures of marine harvesting machinery.

7 MURDERS IN MONTH NEAR EDMONTON

EDMONTON, Alta., Nov. 17.—Another murder case, involving the invocation of the unwritten law, occurred on Saturday last at Downsview, 14 miles northeast of here.

The murdered man is Wasyly Wasylyk, and the woman accused of the crime is his wife, 10 years his junior. Their marriage took place when the wife was but 13 years of age. There are two children. At the inquest today, the jury, after returning a verdict of murder against the woman, added a rider that there should be a law against unfaithfulness, "which leads to such crimes." Evidence was given at the inquest to the effect that a quarrel of long standing was continued with respect to the husband's relations with a widow. This is the seventh murder in the Edmonton district within a month.



