SOME TRICKS TO TEACH YOUR DOG

NO. 5—HOW TO TEACH YOUR DOG TO "SIT UP" (PICTURE POSED BY "HECTOR.")

Sitting up is a trick that requires the careful development of the muscles of a dog's back. Do not try to teach this trick to a dog under eight months old, as his back is too weak to bear the strain.

Place the dog in the corner of the room so he will have the support of the walls on all sides, and each time arrange his hind legs in a bracing position. The only way he can get down is to fall forward. Keep him from falling forward by tapping him under the chin, as shown in Hector's pose, and at the same time command him to "sit up."

The dog will not enjoy being tapped under the chin and will quickly make an effort to hold himself up in the corner. Lessons for this trick must be brief as the dog will tire quickly. After he sits up in the corner try him against the side wall where he will have support only at his back. He will seldom topple over sideways, and your tapping under his chin will keep him from falling forward. Repeat the command "Sit up."

When he has learned to sit up against a support, teach him to sit up in an open space without support, tapping him under the chin as before and commanding emphatically, "Sit up!"

It is unwise to try to train a dog when other persons are near to attract his attention and take his mind off the work. (Another lesson will appear tomorrow.)

FINDS A WAY TO LENGTHEN LIFE

Ohio Boy, 24 years Old, Controls Animal Growth in Tests

TRYING IT ON BABIES

COLUMBUS, O., Nov. 17.—In science, after all, to find that mysterious "elixir of life" which the ancients sought in vain? Will human life be prolonged far beyond its normal span? A youngster in the scientific



world, working in the laboratories of Ohio State university here has made a discovery which may double or triple the span of human life.

Already he has spent seven months, under direction of Dr. Ernest Scott and Dr. J. F. Lyman, experimenting with this "elixir of life" on human subjects.

E. M. Black is his name. Only 24, he has discovered a hitherto unknown substance, found in practically all animal and human foods, with which the growth and development of animals can be absolutely controlled.

Deprived of it, an animal sickens and dies. Black guardedly admits these experiments on human beings have produced "some favorable results which cannot be announced as yet."

"Scientists always have held that all foods are made up of five well-known substances—water, fats, carbohydrates, proteins and minerals," Black explains. "I have discovered a sixth component."

up for air. He worked all night. The rescuers were forced to dig and hack their way thru a mass of dirt and a network of broken timbers.

The first bodies found were on the level branching from the main slope, 800 feet below the surface. They were Jack Errington and Jacob Hanshack, both killed by falling timbers.

Find Miners Alive A little beyond they found Dominick Novaria, timberman, still alive. They rushed him to the surface, but he died within a few minutes.

The only miners whose lives were spared up to dawn Wednesday morning were Mike Perlich, Mike Donohack and Martin Mitzner, who were found on the second level, overcome by gas.

They were revived by pulmonators. Early in the evening aid came from Black Diamond, Burnett, Roslyn and Cle Elum, and the mine rescue outfit from the University of Washington.

Find Foreman at Desk After a first attempt to reach the trapped men on the third level had failed, a more successful attempt was made thru the another slope, which penetrates to all three levels. This slope also was clogged, tho not so badly, with wreckage.

The workers penetrated to the third level by 8:55 p. m. They faced a solid wall of wreckage and caving-in coal. They attacked slop fiercely, and after a time came upon P. J. Kane, the foreman, sitting at the desk in his office, huddled up, his face black with burns—dead!

Beyond him they saw other bodies. Later in the evening they sent up those of C. B. Davis, pump man, and M. Pennechi, a laborer.

Can't Determine Cause That there were not more than a dozen additional men killed is due to the blowing out of a fuse in the power plant, Tuesday forenoon. The blowing rendered the hoisting machinery temporarily useless. A band of "diggers," employed on contract, came to the surface and waited until the fuse could be repaired.

C. M. Anderson, manager of the Northwestern Improvement Co., said he was unable to determine the cause of the explosion, and added that there has never been gas trouble in the mine.

A feature of the rescue work was the use of canaries to test the presence of afterdamp as the rescuers descended.

A flock of the birds was taken into the mine at 9 p. m. and released. Use Canaries in Rescue Chirping as they were released, they flew farther and farther into the black depths, the rescuers following them, knowing that as long as the birds chirped they were safe. Their chirping grew fainter and fainter. Then the men began finding dead bodies.
