KILLS HIMSELF; LEAVES A LOVE LETTER TO GIRL

Miss Frances Hite, 822 Queen Ave. ave., is mentioned in a note left by George Reucroft, formerly of Juneau, Alaska, and Coalinga, Cal., found dead Wednesday afternoon in a room at the Rainier-Grand hotel, with a bullet wound in his head and a revolver on the floor.
Jealousy over Miss Hite seemingly is the motive for the suicide. "She knows all the details that led me to this," he wrote in a note. He left an open and a sealed note to the girl. In the open note he wrote:
"Will you kindly sing the beautiful song, 'A Perfect Day,' for the only one that ever loved you? God bless you, Fannie, in my last sincere wish. I have never left the room since you left me Saturday night. * * * I am going to do what I said I would, so here is hoping you have a good time after the steamship Northwestern comes in, Mr. * * * and you."
The man referred to is an officer on the Northwestern, and the note indicated that he was Reucroft's rival for the girl's hand.

YOUNG HUSBAND, SUED, SAYS BABY IS NOT HIS CHILD

Elmo W. Sperry, a chauffeur, recently divorced from the daughter of Vernon Buck, prominent Seattle attorney, who lives at 715 N. 61st st., protested in superior court Thursday against paying alimony for the support of his infant son, on the ground that he is in doubt as to the child's parentage.
In an affidavit which Mrs. Sperry's attorneys have requested the court to order destroyed, Sperry sets out his reasons for believing he is not the real father of his former wife's son.
Their wedding, Sperry says, was brought about at the request of Mrs. Buck, the girl's mother.
He, the girl and the latter's father, Sperry says, went to Westminster, B. C., to have the ceremony performed, returning to Seattle by the next train.
He was 17 years old and she 16 at that time, he alleges, and he was unable to support a wife, though he finally got a position at \$50 a month. Their household bills, rent and other expenses were borne, he says, by Mrs. Buck.
Mrs. Sperry and he began quarreling shortly after the birth of the son, and she told him to leave the house, which he did, he declares.
He rebels at being forced to pay \$10 a month for the boy's support, as was ordered at the time of the divorce.

MUFFLERS ASKED FOR ROOSTERS!

The public safety committee Wednesday afternoon listened to a delegation of the residents of Ravenna Heights, in a protest against the chicken farm which they asserted Mrs. A. D. Rogers proposes to develop in the heart of the district, and to the detriment of their property.
The delegation was preceded by a petition setting forth their arguments.
One of the first speakers was a resident of the Heights who styled himself "an innocent bystander."
He said that if chickens were not to be abolished altogether in the city limits, there should at least be mufflers on the roosters. He was for some sort of regulation.
"The whole matter is pretty well covered in an ordinance now," said Councilman Erickson.
"For a number of years the neighbors have maintained chickens directly below my bedroom window, and I have had to enjoy the music the best way I could."
She Wants More Chickens
Mrs. Sophia Hall of Ballard was the next speaker.
She said she had come in response to an invitation printed in The Star for all those interested to attend. She advised throwing the petition in the garbage can.
She said the town would be a lot better off if more chickens, with real feathers on them, were raised.
Mr. John Mead, 6032 30th ave. N. E., who lives only a block from Mrs. Rogers, arose to champion the cause of the chickens. He said he had seen nothing about Mrs. Rogers' farm to shock the public in any way.
He characterized the whole disturbance as a neighborhood quarrel.
If the committee acceded to the wishes of the petitioners it would be taking the first step toward denying the citizens all their liberties, he declared.
All Here for Purpose
"Some people like poultry, some like dogs, and others like cats," Mr. Mead continued. "They were all put into the world for some useful purpose. I ask that you dismiss this petition with the contempt it deserves!"
Mrs. D. Jones, who lives immediately next door to Mrs. Rogers, said she was the one who suffered most, and she intimated that Mrs. Rogers was planning on raising several hundred chickens thru the winter.
Mr. Mead again rose to deny it. Mrs. Rogers said she would keep only about 150.
Gill Favors Ordinance
It being intimated by one of the speakers that Mayor Gill would favor an ordinance prohibiting chickens in the city, Councilman Erickson remarked in caustic tones:
"If the mayor has such an ordinance in view, he might draw it up and send it in. We will be glad to consider it."
The committee referred the petition to the board of health.
Mayor Gill later denied he would favor an ordinance prohibiting all chickens in the city. He said he told the delegation that if they got an ordinance thru the council specifying that chicken ranches for commercial purposes must not be placed within certain distances of residences, he would consider signing it.
It was recalled that his honor was considerable of a poultry fancier himself, he having broken his arm while feeding his flock at one time.
"I would suggest that the council, which has two clerks whose salaries are \$500 a month, one of them an expert stenographer and legal adviser, draw up the ordinance," said the mayor.

TEN TRICKS TO TEACH YOUR DOG

NO. 6—TEACHING YOUR DOG TO WALK ON HIND LEGS. (PICTURE POSED BY "HECTOR.")

As in trick No. 5, a dog to walk on his hind legs and dance must be given plenty of practice to develop the muscles in his legs and back, so they may support the weight of his body in the unnatural position. Take the dog's fore paws in your hand and compel him to walk about the room on his hind legs. Repeat frequently, but allow him to rest between trials.
Keep his body up as straight as possible, and he will soon try to hold himself up straight and bear less on your hand. When he shows a willingness to be led in this manner, remove your supporting hand, but each time catch him as he begins to fall.
Your command or cue word now should be "Up!" repeated frequently and emphatically, with an occasional tap under the chin. He will remember that in learning to sit up, the tap under the chin meant for him to hold up his head.
As his back and legs gain strength, the dog will be able to take a few steps straight and bear less on your hand. Whistling and thru patient drilling will learn to walk about the room at your command.

KRAUSE TAKEN OFF SHIP; HELD IN TACOMA JAIL

Capt. of Detectives Tennant contended Thursday that the case of Edward Krause, of Ketchikan, arrested here Monday on a charge of impersonating a federal officer, is one of the biggest that has come to the attention of the Seattle police department in years.
Tennant is certain Krause could explain the disappearance of at least three men, and possibly more.
Krause is being held in Tacoma, Thursday, following an attempt by his attorneys to have the charges against him dismissed, Wednesday.
He was bound over to the federal grand jury Wednesday, following a hearing before U. S. Commissioner R. W. McClelland, and his bond was fixed at \$7,500.
Federal Judge Neterer signed an order for Krause's removal to Alaska. But after he had been taken aboard the steamship Alameda, his attorneys secured a writ of habeas corpus, and Krause was taken off again and taken to Tacoma, pending another hearing.
Juneau, Alaska, is excited over the arrest of Krause.
Krause is consistently denying all the charges, but he is becoming worried.

8 N.P. CARS PILED IN DITCH WHEN AN AXEL BREAKS

Eight Northern Pacific cars, loaded with merchandise, are piled in a ditch at Henry switch, one and a half miles west of Ravensdale. A broken axle on one of the cars caused seven following it to jump the track, at 3 a. m. Thursday. No body was injured.
The train was westbound from Ellensburg. Northern Pacific officials said the line would be clear at 3 p. m. Thursday. Meantime passenger traffic is being detoured via the Buckley branch and Puyallup.
The damage will amount to several thousand dollars.
