WOULD ALTER PORT RATE SCHEDULES

R. M. He suggests that the commission establish a fixed wharfage charge at all terminals which may be included in the ocean rate of all shipping concerns.

WANTS WIFE FOR HER 62-YEAR-OLD SON

OAKLAND, Nov. 18.—Mrs. Cora Butler's 62-year-old son's wanderings are at an end. His 80-year-old mother declared today she believes in a marriageable age and she is looking for a bride for him.

ATTEMPT MADE TO WRECK TRAIN

FRESNO, Nov. 18.—Officials sought today to run down would-be wreckers of the Fresno flyer, who last night tried to ditch the train by putting ties on the track.

BODY OF UNKNOWN FOUND ON TRACKS

The body of an unidentified man was found early Thursday, lying near the Milwaukee tracks, about a block from the Lucile st. bridge. The coroner thinks he fell off a Milwaukee freight train.

KILLS BANDIT IN HOTEL LOBBY DUEL

RANDBURG, Cal., Nov. 18.—Fighting a pistol duel with a suspected burglar in the dark lobby of the Houser hotel today, David Thompson, proprietor of the house, shot and killed the bandit, who was identified as Louis Gonzales, of Trona, Cal.

GOES TO FIGHT FOR PREPAREDNESS

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 18.—Congressman Wm. B. Stephens, of Los Angeles, left for Washington tonight to fight in the lower house for war preparedness. Stephens says he favors a national defense board, with unlimited authority over military affairs, the construction of 100 submarines, 10 battleships, six battle cruisers, many aeroplanes and auxiliary vessels.

SAN DIEGO FAIR OPENS IN 1916, TOO

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 18.—Less than \$15 remained to be raised to complete the \$150,000 which must be furnished here to help keep the San Diego fair open during 1916. The committee in charge hoped to have all the cash on hand before the end of the week.

\$10,000 IN POULTRY SHOW AT FAIR

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 18.—The Panama-Pacific Exposition Poultry show opens today. In addition to the fowls that were exhibited, hundreds of pets, ranging from mice to monkeys, occupied cages. The value of the fowls on exhibition was estimated at \$10,000.

THINK VIOLET ROBERTS WILL RECOVER

Violet Roberts, believed mortally wounded by her father, George Roberts, the Hillman city plumber, who, during temporary madness, sought to exterminate his family of five, will recover from revolver wounds inflicted on the morning of November 5, according to the city hospital attendants Thursday. Her 15-year-old brother, George, who was frightfully gashed with an ax, has not regained consciousness. Doctors attending him say he has an even chance of recovery. Their mother and older sister were both instantly killed, the father committing suicide.

SOCIETY LEADER "BLACK HANDED"

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 18.—Mrs. Francis Carolan, society leader, gave no indication today that she had been perturbed by the receipt of several "black hand" letters threatening her with death unless she drops all connection with the case of Antonio Fodera, arrested in connection with the death of Hester Zapeda. Zapeda, a Santa Clara university student, was struck and killed by Fodera's automobile. Mrs. Carolan witnessed the accident and caused Fodera's arrest.
