FLEES TO SAVE MAN; WIFE HELD

Attorneys May Be Implicated in Alleged Witness Plot

FOUND IN CALIFORNIA

Mrs. Grace Witz, divorced wife of Fred H. Witz, of Cedar Falls, was brought back here Friday from Los Angeles as a witness in a criminal case pending against her ex-husband, and is being held in a secret place by order of Deputy Prosecutor Hellsell.

Her disappearance a few days after she obtained a divorce from Witz, caused an investigation by the prosecutor and may result in seriously involving two prominent Seattle attorneys, said to have caused her hurried exit.

Witz was to have been tried Wednesday for an alleged attack upon his 12-year-old daughter. The case was continued because witnesses had vanished.

Investigation showed that Mrs. Witz had moved all her household goods from the home at Cedar Falls, taken her three children, and departed hastily for Los Angeles.

She shipped the furniture to 1815 Washington st., Los Angeles. This turned out to be a fictitious address, the location of which would have been in the middle of a large cemetery.

On Monday last, Mrs. Witz and her two daughters were picked up by Deputy Sheriff J. F. Nolan, of Los Angeles, at the home of her mother, Mrs. Minnie Gorham, in that city.

Mrs. Witz, it was ascertained, had made the last leg of her secret journey, from San Francisco to San Pedro, on board a lumber schooner.

Her mother, who had met her at Portland, took her daughter's small son, and went direct to Los Angeles.

The warrant on which Mrs. Witz was arrested charges "tampering with witnesses."

Deputy Sheriff Nolan arrived here with the mother and daughters Thursday evening.

Deputy Prosecutor Hellsell declined to say where the witness prisoners were being confined, but they are neither in the county nor in the city jail, nor at the prosecutor's office.

"They are being held in custody," was all he would say.

Mrs. Witz is said to have told the arresting officers that she was urged to leave the state by two lawyers prominent in Seattle.



64TH CONGRESS IS IMPORTANT

Coming Session Will Consider Most Vital Things in Years

A LIST OF PROBLEMS

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19.—THE MOST IMPORTANT CONGRESS SINCE THE CIVIL WAR will convene in the capital in December. Why most important? There are 13 reasons. Here they are:

1. WAR PREPAREDNESS—Plans for the increase of the army and navy; the Garrison and Daniels programs, including the question of whether the government will manufacture its own armor plate and projectiles, and the establishment of the proposed scientific laboratory for naval research work.
2. REVENUES—How the money shall be raised to meet war preparation; whether by sale of bonds, tariff duties or direct taxation.
3. TARIFF—Whether sugar shall retain its duties, and other articles be brought under tariff duties for both revenue and protection; the problem of dye stuffs and other articles cut off by the war.
4. NON-TARIFF METHODS OF RAISING REVENUES—Possible amendment to the income tax law providing that the rate of income tax payers be made public with the amount they pay in order to check up tax dodging. Possible inheritance tax law following out the recommendations of the Walsh industrial relations commission.
5. SHIP PURCHASE—Whether the government shall appropriate for the purchase of a fleet of merchant vessels to aid American and foreign trade and act as naval auxiliaries in time of war.
6. CLOTURE—Whether the senate shall adopt a rule to limit debate and compel a vote after a reasonable time has been spent in debate.
7. The regular appropriation bills for the civil service.
8. CONSERVATION—Taking up again the consideration of bills for leasing water power on the public domain; regulating the use of water power on navigable streams; leasing and regulation of public grazing lands; leasing of mineral lands; government operation of radium lands.
9. The pork barrel and river and harbor bill.
10. An attempt by the shipping trust to secure a modification or repeal of the seaman's law.
11. WOMAN SUFFRAGE—The Susan B. Anthony amendment to the constitution of the United States. Already a demonstration of 5,000 women is planned for the opening of congress.
12. THE WALSH INDUSTRIAL RELATIONS COMMISSION REPORT—Proposed legislation dealing with unemployment, taxation of land values, child labor, inheritance taxation, etc.
13. RURAL CREDITS LEGISLATION—Whether the administration will heed the demand of farmers that this frequently postponed subject shall be taken up and acted on.
